## MAYOR UPDATE

As we transition into spring here in Sherwood, I look back on the first few months of 2016 and am energized by the excellent start to the New Year. Back in late January, I led our City Council in our annual goal setting retreat and we worked together to identify major projects and initiatives for the upcoming year. The results of this productive retreat will be summarized by staff and brought back to City Council for final approval of our work plan at our first meeting in March. This important work plan will provide clear direction to the City Manager and staff members by prioritizing projects identified by your elected officials and keeps Sherwood moving positively forward.

Among the top priorities that came out of our council retreat were the need to plan for the contract expiration of the current operating agreement for our Sherwood Recreational Center, with the YMCA, which will occur in 2018, and the need to have a cost/benefit analysis of providing public safety and protection for our citizens. It is imperative that we, as a council, review all of our options in providing the most effective and efficient method of providing these vital services to our citizens. There have been a few who have criticized these two important reviews and would like us to not review other options and instead just rubber stamp a renewal with the current operator, the YMCA, without any additional review or analysis of other operating possibilities and continue to grow our Sherwood Police Department without any analysis of options available.

This council does not agree with the approach of "It's always been done this way, so it must be the best way". I am proud to say that this council is open to reviewing all the information available to us to provide the best possible products and services to our residents at the lowest possible cost. We have an excellent police force and want to remain attractive as an employer by continually reviewing and considering all options available to us in providing this service to our residents. I am not now, nor ever, going to be afraid of gathering all of the information possible about all options in providing services to our citizens for fear of political backlash. As elected officials it is our responsibility to be fiscally responsible to all our taxpayers, not politically aligned to independent contractors.

In mid-February, I attended the New Partners for Smart Growth conference that was fortunately hosted by the Portland region this year. Joining me at the conference were Councilors Harris, Kuiper and Brouse along with Planning Commissioner Chair Jean Simson and Commissioner Alan Pearson and several city staff. The event is the nation's largest smart growth and sustainability event with the theme for the 2016 conference being "Practical Tools and Innovative Strategies for Creating Great Communities," underscoring a stronger emphasis on implementation tools and strategies, and new technologies that will help communities now. In so many ways, Sherwood is already a great community, but as we deal with various growth and development challenges, it is critical that we utilize all possible tools and strategies to maintain our high quality of life. I was particularly struck by one of the seminars on building parks to accommodate an aging population and citizens with disabilities. Studies have shown that one of our fastest growing segments of our population is our senior community. I want to be focused on serving all of our great residents with our city projects as they are being constructed and this conference is one of many ways that information and ideas to accomplish one goal of age inclusion and accessibility can be reached. I value all of our residents and want to make Sherwood a great place to live, work, learn, play and retire.

On a final note, as announced at my State of the City address in February, I will be running again in November 2016 to continue to serve the Sherwood community as your Mayor. In this speech, I highlighted our many successes of the past year and identified some of the key goals for our future. It has been my honor and privilege to serve as your Mayor this past year, and there is so much more work to be done. We have come so far in believing that together we can talk through difficult issues, agree and disagree - without being disagreeable. With your support, I am dedicated to moving Sherwood positively forward.

## FIREFIGHTERS 'GO RED' FOR CARDIAC AWARENESS

On National Wear Red Day held every year on the first Friday in February, about 350 TVF&R firefighter medics, training officers and fire prevention staff exchanged their blue duty uniform shirts for red ones in recognition that heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women, claiming more lives than all forms of cancer combined.

They will continue to wear the shirts throughout American Heart Month to help raise awareness in TVF&R's service area about the importance of knowing the signs and symptoms of a heart attack, which can be different for men and women.

The red shirts sport an important message: "Know the signs of a heart attack, don't delay, and call 911."

Identifying the symptoms of a heart attack and immediately calling 911 can trigger a potentially lifesaving continuum of care for a cardiac patient. Firefighter medics can begin advanced medical care in the field, and hospitals with a dedicated catheterization lab and

chest pain center can provide an expert diagnosis and fast, effective treatment.

While the message is equally important for both men and women, we know that awareness of heart disease and gender-specific heart symptoms in women has severely lagged behind that of men. Only one in five women in the United States believes it is her greatest health threat.

TVF&R crews responded to 3,580 cardiac-related calls in 2015 compared to 3,067 dispatched calls with patients in the district's service area exhibiting chest pain or in need of CPR in 2014.

To combat those numbers, TVF&R's team of emergency responders continually train to hone their high-performance CPR skills in addition to partnering with law enforcement agencies, area hospitals, local schools and community groups to raise awareness of cardiac health issues.

"We will continue to provide the most effective

advanced medical care possible and tirelessly advocate for the heart health of our community," said Fire Chief Mike Duyck.

As with men, the most common heart attack symptom in women is chest pain or discomfort. But women are more likely to experience the other common symptoms - particularly shortness of breath, nausea, vomiting, and back or jaw pain. They are also symptoms that women often brush off as the flu, stress, or simply feeling under the weather, which could put their lives in jeopardy.

TVF&R crews often hear heart attack patients say, "I wasn't sure it was a heart attack," or "I didn't want to bother anyone."

Remember, TVF&R is here for you. Our highly trained firefighter medics can diagnose a heart attack and start treatment right away. Crews can also relay your EKG information to the hospital, enabling its staff to activate special heart teams and prepare for your arrival.

### Community Input

By the time you read this article, the Police Staffing Study will be complete, or nearing completion. Your police department wants to thank you for the input you provided and for your continued support. It was a daunting process and required a lot of staff time and resources, but in the end it will be an extremely valuable tool.

As I have said before, getting timely, relevant and consistent community input and feedback has always been a challenge for local law enforcement (usually because we don't ask) and it is no different in Sherwood. As the staffing study was developed, it was critically important to us that you have a voice in your police department, and be given the opportunity to tell Matrix (our consultants), the city and the police department what you think about policing in Sherwood and the police department.

There were two opportunities for community input built into the staffing study. First, there was a community input dessert that drew about 35 stakeholders. During that event, folks were asked to provide their response to three questions regarding the police department. Attendees were able to provide their own

personal responses and take part in table discussions about all the responses. Second, there was a community survey developed and deployed using Survey Monkey. As I am preparing this article, about 280 stakeholders have completed the survey and provided their thoughts and feelings about the police department and the types of service they value.

The staffing study will report on data, but just as important, it will report on how you feel about crime, safety and your police department. We know what the statistics show; Sherwood is a safe community, but the staffing study will also include your input about crime and safety in Sherwood.

Special thanks go to Mayor Clark and City Council for their support of the staffing study, and to the Sherwood Police Advisory Board who have also supported the study and supported the community input components.

## COUNCIL CORNER

In light of the tragic loss of Sherwood High Graduate and Seaside Police Officer Sgt. Jason Goodding, I want to share some thoughts regarding law enforcement and our Sherwood Police Department. Last Tuesday, I was fortunate to be able to complete my 2nd ride-a-long with our Code Compliance Officer. I was surprised to learn that I am the only member of the City Council to do ride-a-longs with our Code Officer. At the beginning of the shift I observed the processing of evidence obtained over the weekend by our officers. The kind of evidence processed included a sexual assault case, a strangulation case, minor in possession drug case, and some additional evidence needed for a recent stabbing crime.

I believe most residents would be surprised to learn that in our evidence room we are storing over 7,000 items. I did not appreciate the complexity or risk associated with police work until I did a Friday night ride-a-long in Sherwood in 2009. Also, I will not apologize for being a supporter of the first-rate and highly trained police officers who report to work each day.

We are fortunate to live in a very safe community...the result of continued commitment, training, professionalism, and self-sacrifice by our Police Department. On the wall at the Oregon Department Public Safety Standards and Training facility is this quote, "Serve with Honor / Defend with Courage /

Train with Passion." The profession of law enforcement has become one of the most controversial and at times, divisive jobs in America. As an elected official, I hope that I never vote for legislation that makes a Police Officer's job more difficult. Everyday, our officers answer the call to serve our community. Everyday, they place themselves in harm's way to protect our City and preserve our way of life in Sherwood.

Sgt. Jason Goodding's family did not believe that Friday, Feb. 5th would be the last time they would see him alive. However, this is a stark reality for the families of law enforcement officers almost every week in the United States. The criminal who shot and killed Sgt. Goodding had methamphetamine, marijuana, and alcohol (0.11) in his system. This career criminal had 17 felonies, 21 misdemeanors and had been booked into the County jail 41 times.

The words "trusted, mentor, coach, respected, and resourceful", were used to describe Jason Goodding and his commitment to Seaside. I hope that we can honor his memory and the choice he made to be a police officer by supporting and not second guessing the officers who serve our community now and in the future. As Redmond Oregon Police Officer Curtis Chambers stated "It could have happened to any of us, and there is a person behind that badge."

### Recreational Marijuana

In 2014, Oregon voters approved Ballot Measure 91, legalizing recreational marijuana. The ballot measure approved the possession of recreational marijuana for personal use and tasked the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) with developing rules on how to regulate the various recreational marijuana businesses.

On January 19, 2016, the Sherwood City Council approved a resolution to place the issue of banning recreational marijuana facilities on the November 2016 ballot. By placing the issue on the ballot, there is a temporary ban on the sale, production, and processing of recreational marijuana facilities within the City of Sherwood until the election. At that time, Sherwood voters will decide if the City should prohibit recreational marijuana facilities within Sherwood city limits.

In the event that Sherwood voters do not prohibit recreational marijuana facilities from locating in Sherwood, the Planning Commission is beginning the process of creating local rules concerning recreational marijuana. To assist in the rulemaking, the Sherwood community will be asked to take an online survey available March 1-31 and participate at a Planning Commission Public Work Session on March 10, 2016. Industrial Uses

### Industrial Uses

In 2010, the Sherwood City Council adopted the final concept plan for the Tonquin Employment Area (TEA). The Tonquin Employment Area, which will help grow the Sherwood economy and bring more jobs to the community, is located between Tualatin-Sherwood Road and Tonquin Road south of Oregon Street. In 2013, the residents of Sherwood voted to support annexation when property owners choose to submit requests to the City Council. Upon annexation, the properties will be zoned Employment Industrial (EI).

In an effort to continue to help facilitate the ultimate development of the area, the City applied for and received a grant from Metro to prepare an implementation plan for the TEA. The purpose of the implementation plan was to evaluate the best uses for the area and identify regulatory and financial barriers that may be preventing the area from developing.

This has led to the city launching a project to update the allowed uses on all industrially zoned properties and exploring modifications to the use categories in the development code. The development code contains a list of uses that are allowed, allowed conditionally, or not permitted in the city and houses the rules and regulations that guide the way a project looks and the type of uses permitted. It is envisioned that the end result will be more clarity and more uses permitted.

## PLANNING NEWS CONTINUED

Over the past few months, the Planning Commission has held work sessions with the public and property owners with interest in industrially zoned lands to review, consider, and revise the allowed uses within the City. A public hearing with the Planning Commission is tentatively scheduled for 7:00 pm on April 12 at City Hall for the resulting development code changes. The Planning Commission will make a recommendation to the City Council who ultimately makes the final decision on the proposed revisions. ### The Cedar Creek Trail is Moving Forward!

The past six months, we have been busy working on the design and alignment for the Cedar Creek Trail. The first segment, about 2 miles long, is being designed now with construction planned for 2017.

This portion starts at the eastern edge of Sherwood, follows Oregon Street into Old Town, connects with the existing trail in Stella Olsen Park along the Cedar Creek corridor and heads north under Washington Street and along the creek to the intersection of Highway 99W and SW Meinecke.

The trail alignment for the northern segment, located within the Cedar Creek corridor north of Highway 99W and extending to Roy Rogers Road, still needs to be determined. In December 2015, our local trail advisory committee (LTAC) and the Parks Advisory Board endorsed a preliminary alignment for further study within this portion of the Cedar Creek corridor that is shown below. Next steps will include surveying this alignment to make sure that it is a feasible route and get some preliminary cost estimates. We will then share the information with the community later this spring. ### Municipal Court Amnesty Program

Sherwood and Newberg Municipal Courts are offering a one-time only amnesty program to forgive a portion of overdue fines owed when you pay in full between February 15, 2016 and May 15, 2016. To participate in this program, you must follow the guidelines below:

- Overdue fines are defined as those that are currently under suspension status and/or have been sent to the collection agency. Cases with restitution owed and criminal cases are excluded.
- You will receive fifty-percent (50%) of the total balance due. Reductions will not be given for partial payments.
- Payment must be in the form of cash, money order, cashier's check, visa or mastercard. Payments can be made in person, via mail or taken over the phone.
- Driver license reinstatement papers will be given at the time of payment in full. You may also be subject to a \$75.00 fee payable to the DMV to reinstate your driver's license.

### New Road Construction Begins

As the first signs of spring are in the air a couple of roadway projects are ready to commence. Two local Sherwood roads are getting an improved storm water maintenance improvement along with new surfacing. Also, on the city's eastern doorstep, the 124th Avenue Extension project will get started, which will include the laying of the first segments of the water supply pipeline that will ultimately extend from Wilsonville to Hillsboro and Beaverton.

In Sherwood, construction will begin in April for a new storm sewer system followed by a newly surfaced street. The existing storm sewer system will be abandoned. Some driveways on the lower portion of the street will be fashioned with an asphalt berm to direct surface water runoff to the storm sewer collection areas and away from personal property.

Another nearby street, SW Tualatin, will be undergoing a more complete makeover. A new storm sewer will be installed along with new catch basins. Then the current gravel roadway will be reconstructed as a newly paved street. Included within this project is a widening of SW Washington St at the SW Tualatin St intersection to accommodate on-street parking and new curbs.

While both projects will directly affect the residents on these and surrounding streets, through traffic might also experience brief delays and detours.
