### Celebrating Success

This year's Summer Reading Program, "Every Hero has a Story" concludes at the end of August. Over 1,400 youth signed-up—that's about 1/3 of Sherwood youth and a 16% increase from last year. The program encourages reading for enjoyment and as a family—both linked with success in school. Nearly 300 adults have also signed up as well. Special thanks to local sponsors: Oregon State Library, Washington County Cooperative Library Services (WCCLS), City of Sherwood, Friends of the Sherwood Library, Sherwood Ice Arena, Dutch Bros, Fat Milos, Escape to Yoga, McMenamins, The Oregon Garden, OUR Table Collective, Red Ridge Farms and Vista Hot Air Balloons.

The end of summer is also a time to reflect on the close of the 2014-15 fiscal year. The Sherwood Public Library:

- Provided 460 programs for all ages with 15,400 attendees - 100 programs specifically for school-aged youth.
- Saw 251,500 visits to the library, nearly 1,300 new patrons, and over 351,000 checkouts.
- Added nearly 7,000 items to the collection—26% more than the previous year—bringing the local collection to over 49,000 items. Library card holders have access to 1.6 million print and digital items, thanks to our membership in WCCLS.

## FEATURED PARTNER: SHERWOOD SCHOOL DISTRICT

With the new school year nearly upon us, the Sherwood School District looks forward with excitement toward the new school year, including adapting to the changes that resulted from the work of last year that was designed to improve the quality of service Sherwood schools offer kids, families and staff. The following includes some of the recent milestones within the District.

Over the course of the last few years, our district has been experiencing imbalances in enrollment in the elementary and middle schools, with some schools over capacity and others under. To ensure we could sustain quality education for all students and support teachers by providing manageable class sizes for future years to come, we needed to make some adjustments to the boundaries. In the fall of 2014, a Boundary Adjustment Committee was formed with 12 Sherwood parent volunteers who worked with an outside facilitator to make recommendations for boundary adjustments throughout Sherwood School District. The Board of Directors adopted a modified boundary adjustment recommended by the Boundary Adjustment Committee at their regular monthly meeting on March 11, 2015. The changes will be in effect for the 2015-16 school year.

Regarding support for staff, an important tool used in ensuring that the District maintains high standards for learning, is providing time for staff to improve their practice through collaboration with colleagues and administrators. Because a large body of research supports the use of effective teacher collaboration (which has historically occurred during early release days) as a means for improving student outcomes, and because Sherwood Schools' leadership believes that there is always room for professional growth, administrators and teachers spent the 2014-15 school year researching effective collaboration practices. An important part of our research process was reaching out to stakeholder groups to seek feedback about changes to the current model that would allow staff more time to collaborate. The Board of Directors approved a modification to the early release schedule in June 2015 to accommodate increased Collaboration Learning Teams (CLT) time for staff professional development. The changes are: early release day moved from Fridays to Wednesdays; teams will meet fifteen times during the school year; collaboration time increased from 90 to 120 minutes; compensated for increased collaboration time by reducing conference days at all levels;

compensated for increased collaboration time by adding five minutes to the instructional day at the elementary level.

We are excited about the adjustment to the CLT model and look forward to the positive effects it will ultimately have on learning for our students. During the spring of 2014, Sherwood School District participated in an Organizational Assessment process during which we learned that without a clear strategic plan in place, there can be confusion or lack of clarity about priorities and areas of focus. Recognizing this need and the importance it holds in aligning the goals for all staff and students, the District took a huge step in beginning to create a strategic plan by embarking into a visioning process that began in the fall. Two Strategic Planning work sessions brought together Sherwood School District's Board of Directors, district administrators, school staff, and community representatives, and offered opportunities for input during the process from additional stakeholders and anyone interested in seeing the progress of the work. Administrators are currently working to define a meaningful, measurable strategic plan that will guide initiatives, the work we do, and the budgets we develop. The strategic plan is expected to be complete and introduced to stakeholders in the 2015-16 school year.

## MAYOR UPDATES

It has been an interesting and busy month here in Sherwood for me as your Mayor! As I write this article, I can still see lingering smoke from the tragic fire that engulfed our historic railroad trestle. Communications have flooded in from citizens and Oregon leaders near and far devastated by the loss of this 85 year old historical structure and iconic symbol of our rich Oregon history. As the embers gasp for their final crack and disappear leaving a hole in our landscape and hearts, there is a sadness that lingers. To that end, I have asked the Historical Society to partner with the City to create memorial dedication pieces for our trestle and many other lost but not forgotten historical monuments that make Sherwood, Sherwood such as the Old School House, the Cedar Sinai Tree, and the Robin Hood Theatre. Together we will rebuild in our hearts and community what tragedy has taken away. While this was primarily a fire incident, our Police and Public Works staff provided great assistance as emergency management partners. City Council recently reached a decision to place a requested annexation of property within the Brookman area south of our current city limits on the November ballot. While not taking a

position on the actual ballot question, the City Council reached the conclusion that our citizens should be the ultimate decision-makers and voted to place the annexation request on the upcoming November election. I anticipate a healthy debate within our community over the upcoming months leading up to Election Day and as always, I encourage voters to spend some time considering this, and every measure, and weighing in at the ballot box. Your vote matters!

I am particularly pleased that Josh Soper, our new City Attorney has recently begun his work here in Sherwood. He is quickly settling into his new position and I look forward to working with him in the coming years.

Finally, I would be remiss to not mention how thrilled I am that Sherwood has once again received national attention as one of the best small towns in the United States by MONEY magazine. We were one of only two cities from the West Coast ranked in the Top Ten in this ranking. Shouting out Sherwood is clearly contagious!

Reflecting back on the past 8 months, it has been quite a roller coaster ride. From the elation of being elected, to realities of the job and amount of work that goes into this volunteer position, including trying to please 19,000 citizens with differing ideas and opinions. I have received attention for chickens lately. In fact, I have become known as the "Chicken Councilor" on various social media sites (a phrase coined by the anti-chicken camp). Honestly, I have NO interest in having chickens at my house. However, after several emails and Facebook messages from citizens, I decided to look into it. Some of you may have seen the city's survey. While the survey isn't a scientific poll and there is a margin for error, it has merit. The overwhelming response of 82% or 430 out of 522 that answered the question "Should the City of Sherwood change its policy to make it easier to allow backyard chickens?" was a resounding YES! To that end, I am supporting backyard chickens in Sherwood. I was elected to represent citizens, not my own wants and needs. I'm not interested in chickens, but after hours of research, I have found that all the myths surrounding chickens are just that... myths. Chickens don't smell, make more noise, or attract rodents any more than dogs and cats do when taken care of properly. A large majority of citizens want to allow backyard chickens. That is why I asked to bring the ordinance forward. ## HELP FIREFIGHTERS QUICKLY FIND YOUR HOME

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue (TVF&R) firefighters responding to emergency calls have noticed several homes in the Sherwood community that do not have visible addresses.

Having a visible address is vital to emergency responders' ability to find the home where an emergency is taking place.

Every second counts in the case of a fire or medical emergency. Being able to quickly locate the cor-



rect address can mean the difference between life and death.

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue is committed to providing fast and efficient emergency response. Sherwood residents can help TVF&R crews as well as police and other first responders by taking a look at the address numbers on your home and making any changes that are needed.

Address numbers should be four inches tall and half an inch wide. They should also be in a color that contrasts with your house color so that they stand out and can be easily seen at night. For example, if you have a dark blue home, use white numbers.

Look at your address from the street to make sure the numbers are visible by vehicles driving through your neighborhood. We recommend moving or trimming shrubbery or branches that cover your address number. Remove any other obstacles such as flags, decorations, recreational vehicles, and

other objects blocking those numbers.

Consider placing numbers under light fixtures on your home to help illuminate your address. If you call 911 to report an emergency, turn on the outside lights to help responding crews quickly locate your home.

If your home is set back or not visible from the street, post your address at the beginning of your driveway. If you are considering a low-cost, reflective address marker to install on your property, visit [www.iaff1660.org](http://www.iaff1660.org) and click on "Address Sign Info."

Thank you for taking steps to help TVF&R crews and other emergency responders find your home and better serve you.

As many of you may already know, the Sherwood Police Department has a mobile app. We launched the app in early June and it has already seen nearly 500 downloads. The concept of "apps" is certainly not new, but police apps are, and as far as we now, Sherwood PD was the first agency in Oregon to utilize this app. Please sign up for the new app using the QR code shown or search for Sherwood PD in your app store.

The Sherwood Police Department's app provides a free and modern method of communication between the Sherwood Police and the Sherwood community. This will be the exclusive app for social media communications from the Department and will include press releases, crime bulletins, traffic alerts, an event calendar, photographs and more.

The app also allows the community to communicate with the police department as well. Once downloaded, the app will allow your smartphone to be your platform for

submitting information and/or feedback to the police department. Some of the user buttons on the app include:

- "Call", which enables one-touch calling to non-emergency police dispatch
- "Tips", which allows users to send information to the police department via an email message
- "Thank-a-Cop", which allows users to identify good work by any of our members and share a positive experience they had with police
- "Notifications", which allows the police department to send out a short message
- "Bulletins", which is where users will find press releases, crime bulletins and messages from Chief Groth
- "Directions", the app even has a feature that will provide directions if the user has their location enabled

Finally, the app also has a "Survey" button and in fact we have posted a survey seeking community input on police services. It is the 2015 Community Desires and Expectations survey. Please take some time and complete the survey, as your voice and opinions matter.

## PLANNING NEWS

### Sherwood West Concept Plan

We are delighted to report that a significant number of people we have asked about Sherwood West are aware of the project. In addition to our citizens spreading the word, staff efforts to keep the public informed of this important project include direct mailers to the property owners within the area, a booth at Music on the Green, talking with people along the Robin Hood festival's parade route, hosting several public events, maintaining an e-mail listserv to keep interested parties in the know, hosting a project website, providing regular updates via Facebook, Twitter, and the TV monitor outside of the public library, and visiting with groups such as the Sherwood morning Rotary.

The Sherwood West project is a preliminary concept plan for approximately 1,291 acres west of Sherwood to accommodate the future growth of Sherwood. The next meeting to discuss refined alternatives with the public is scheduled for September 17, 2015 at the Sherwood Police Department. We plan to continue our outreach efforts, and encourage those of you who are not aware of the project, to take a moment to stop by our website at [www.sherwoodoregon.gov/sherwoodwest](http://www.sherwoodoregon.gov/sherwoodwest).

### Brookman Area Annexation Heads to Ballot

In response to a formal request, the Sherwood City Council voted unanimously to place a proposed annexation of approximately 103 acres of land from the Brookman Road area into the City of Sherwood on August 11, 2015. This area was brought into the Urban Growth Boundary by Metro in 2002 in order to accommodate an identified region wide need for additional land.

The Brookman Concept Plan was adopted by the Council in 2009, and is identified by both the City of Sherwood and Metro as the next area that will be considered for growth. The August 11th public hearing was a continuation of an August 4th public hearing at which both opponents and proponents of the proposal voiced their opinions to the City Council.

The applicant, Holt Group, Inc. proposed to annex eight properties totaling 84.21 acres at the request of five property owners within the area. During the public hearing process, the owners of five additional adjacent properties asked that their properties also be included in the annexation request which increased the amount of land that would be brought in from 84.21 acres to approximately 103 acres including the right-of-way. The majority of the properties included in the request would be zoned Medium Density Residential Low in accordance with the Brookman Concept Plan if the annexation request is approved by Sherwood voters. Approximately 3 to 4 acres would be zoned Medium Density Residential High.

The Holt Group, Inc. indicated that they plan to purchase the area from willing land owners and develop it for single family home development. Additional information about the annexation request can be found online at [www.sherwoodoregon.gov/brookman](http://www.sherwoodoregon.gov/brookman).

The proposed annexation will be on the ballot in the next general election that will be held on November 3, 2015. ## PUBLIC WORKS NEWS

### Street Sweeping Brought In-House

The City of Sherwood Public Works Department has invested in a used street sweeper. Previously, the city was serviced by a third-party street sweeping agency, Clean Water Services. Now, with the purchase of a street sweeper, we have brought the service in-house. We believe this change will enable us to better serve our customers, save money and allow us to perform additional sweeping duties as needed (i.e. prior to scheduled events).

Sweeping will occur Mondays through Thursdays in the first 2 weeks of the month. This schedule may occasionally be altered to correspond with other seasonal activities, like the Curbside Leaf Pick Up Program and winter weather activities. Ultimately, the goal is to sweep every city street once a month.

Residents might see the street sweeper during the early morning hours. Thanks to the new flexibility with scheduling the operations can take place in the early morning, especially on the main roads, outside of the busier times and rush hour.

See which days of what week your street will be serviced and park your cars off-street and remove any trash or recycling bins for optimal cleaning.

### Outdoor Water Conservation Tips

One of the greatest wastes of water is watering your outdoor plants and lawns too much and too often. Using water efficiently outdoors can help conserve the resource while still maintaining a vibrant and lush landscape. The Regional Water Providers Consortium has compiled tips for efficiently using water for your lawns and gardens. Please visit their site at [www.conserveh2o.org](http://www.conserveh2o.org) for more on these tips, indoor water-wise tools, news and events in the area and a Kids' Corner for family activities.

1. Adjust your sprinklers so that they're watering your lawn and garden, and not the street or sidewalk.
2. Water early in the morning (before 10:00 am) or later in the evening (after 6:00 pm) when temperatures are cooler and evaporation is minimized.
3. Set it, but don't forget it! Whether you have a manual or automatic system, be sure to adjust your watering schedules throughout the irrigation season.
4. Water established lawns about 1 inch per week (a bit more during hot, dry weather). Find out how much to water this week with the Weekly Watering Number.
5. Inspect your overall irrigation system for leaks, broken lines or blockage in the lines. A well-maintained system will save you money, water, and time.
6. Consider replacing some turf area with low water use plants and ornamental grasses. They are easier to maintain than turf, look beautiful, and require far less water.
7. Group plants with like watering needs. Creating "watering zones" in your garden will allow you to give each plant the water it requires, not too much or too little.
8. Add a shut-off nozzle to your garden hose and save about 5-7 gallons each minute your hose is on.
9. Adjust your mower to a higher setting. A taller lawn provides shade to the roots and helps retain soil moisture, so your lawn requires less water.
10. Apply the amount of water your soil can absorb. Water thoroughly, but infrequently. If run off or puddling occurs, break longer watering sessions into several short sessions allowing water to soak into the soil between each session.

### New City Attorney Begins Tenure

Sherwood's new City Attorney, Josh Soper recently began working in his position with the City of Sherwood. Mr. Soper was selected to serve as the City Attorney by the Sherwood City Council in July after a recent recruitment period. After utilizing the services of an outside legal firm since 2003, the City Council made the decision to switch to an in-house model similar to our neighboring jurisdictions of Wilsonville and Tualatin. Mr. Soper most recently served as County Counsel for Coos County, Oregon along the southern Oregon coast. He is a proud graduate of the University of Michigan and obtained his law degree from Lewis & Clark Law School here in the Portland region.



By City Charter, the City Attorney is selected by the City Council and is one of four city positions that directly report to the Council. The other three include the City Manager, City Recorder and Municipal Court Judge. "We are very excited to have Josh begin his important work for our City as our first in-house City Attorney in many decades," stated Mayor Krisanna Clark. "He has already hit the ground running."

### Consultant Selected for Police Study

After receiving seven proposals from different consulting firms around the country, Joseph Gall, City Manager has recently selected Matrix Consulting Group to assist the City in conducting a Police Operations and Staffing Study.

The study is designed to evaluate the following key questions:

- The workloads handled and service levels provided by staff in the Police Department.
- The staff resources needed to handle these tasks at a desired service level for each function in the Police Department.
- What choices exist to maximize service while minimizing costs?
- What are the best uses of existing personnel in the Department?

The results of the study will provide a clearer direction for the foreseeable future for public safety, one of the most important services provided by the City of Sherwood.


After a contract is finalized, the study is proposed to take approximately 13 weeks to complete. There will be opportunities for the general public to participate in the project by providing input on the future of the department. The goal is to complete the study before the end of December 2015.
