

Power Surge Strikes Sherwood

On May 22, 2013 we had an unusual power surge in Sherwood. Early indicators show that the surge was due to a tree falling on a power line, just south of the City limits. As you know, this surge caused most of the City to be without power for several hours. Fortunately it occurred during the work week, and crews were working, so they could be dispatched to repair and restore service very quickly. The City was prepared for this event.

Our highly trained staff teamed with our partners at Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue checking door to door for possible fires or other emergencies. We were also present in the TVFR command center in Tigard, and were in constant communication with City leaders and the community.

It is important to be prepared for events like this. Have an emergency preparedness kit for you and your family which might include food, drinking water, blankets, a flashlight with spare batteries, a battery operated radio, and perhaps solar devices to power your radio or to charge your cell phone. More tips on preparedness can be found at www.redcross.org/prepare/location/home-family.

Portland General Electric gives these tips to prepare for power surges. A few preventative steps can go a long way in protecting your home from electrical spikes or surges. If power quality questions come up, please call the PGE Power Quality Hotline at 503.736.5750 or 800.270.7016, or talk with an electrical contractor.

Check your wiring and grounding. Are your lights dimming or getting brighter? Is your electronic equipment acting unreliably? You may have problems with your wiring. Make sure the equipment is plugged into a grounded outlet. Do you live in an older home (built before 1960)? See if

your wiring meets current standards. Check appliances for loose or damaged plugs or poor connections and repair or replace them.

Use outlet surge suppressors. You install these devices between the appliance and the electrical outlet to prevent surges from reaching your sensitive equipment. Invest in protection at your home's electric gateway. By installing a surge protector at your main circuit panel, you safeguard your home's entire electrical system. This includes wiring and appliances.

An Age-Old Sherwood Tradition: The 60th Annual Robin Hood Festival

When a group of friends right after World War II, several Sherwood residents came together to create a group called Robin Hood and his Merry Men, little did they know they were launching a Sherwood tradition that would endure for more than 60 years. Soon they started participating in local parades and events, eventually launching a Sherwood Fall harvest festival in 1952. In 1954, the very first Robin Hood Festival was held in July, as the Sherwood Robin Hood Festival Association came into being in partnership with the city. The first official Maid Marian Court came together that year too, quite an honor for those selected. In 1956, the mayor of Sherwood challenged Nottingham, England to an archery contest, an international event that continues to this day.

The City of Sherwood has always been an integral part of the Robin Hood Festival, a popular Oregon event which now attracts more than 15,000 people each year. This year the festival will be held in Old Town Friday and Saturday, July 19-20, with the 25th annual knighting ceremony to be held on Friday at 6:00 pm in Veterans' Park, a huge community parade on Saturday at 10:00 am, a wide variety of music and

family entertainment, over 100 vendors, castle and flower contests, a teen dance, delicious food and drink and many more activities to delight young and old. And of course, Robin Hood and his Merry Men and the Maid Marian Court will be in attendance, continuing the traditions of long ago.

If you have always wanted to play in a marching band again, the 11th Annual Robin Hood Festival Marching Band is your chance! The band consists of middle and high school students, parents, grandparents and community members. Musicians of all abilities are welcome.

The Sherwood Royal Academy will present multiple performances of Disney's "Little Mermaid JR" Friday and Saturday on the Cannery Square stage. The Royal Academy is made possible by the Voices for the Performing Arts Foundation, with support from the Sherwood Cultural Arts Commission, the City of Sherwood and the Robin Hood Festival Association.

Archers of all ages will participate Saturday and Sunday, July 20-21 in the 58th annual international archery competition with Nottingham, England.

The City of Sherwood and our partners at the Robin Hood Festival invite you to celebrate this special event with us, a tradition that has enchanted multiple

generations in the area for over half a century.

COUNCIL CORNER

Lately there has been a lot of discussion around Urban Renewal (UR) and its effect on our City Budget. UR is a mechanism used by many cities to use property taxes to repair blighted areas by investing in Capital projects. We adopted UR over 10 years ago. The maximum value is \$45,000,000(+/-). Projects built with these funds include the upcoming Community Center and recently completed downtown streets. The majority of dollars can only be spent on costs associated with building capital improvement projects. Here's how UR tax structure operates in simple terms. Property tax revenue distributed to City, County, PCC & others is frozen when the district is formed. Any property tax revenue increase after that point goes to the UR agency. The most dramatic property tax increases occur when a piece of vacant land is developed. Once a certain \$\$\$ value is deposited within the UR agency, then additional property tax revenue is shared between the UR agency, City, County, PCC & others. Once the total \$45,000,000(+/-) is deposited in the UR agency, the district terminates and then all property tax revenue returns to its original distribution list of tax districts. Currently this point is expected in 2021.

With summer upon us, it seems appropriate to talk about safe travel. We know that many families spend significant time during the summer months traveling about on vacation. We want your vacation to be safe and happy, so here are some reminders.

1. Cell phones - Everybody knows the law and knows a hands-free device is required, but what everybody may not know is that a recent study found adults to be the worst offenders of driving distracted. Even if you have a hands-free device, consider waiting until you reach your destination to get caught up on phone calls, texts and emails. Devoting 100% of your attention to driving continues to offer the most safety.

2. Child passenger safety - We all know that young children don't always handle the long trips well. Please resist any temptation to sacrifice the safety of your child by allowing them to move about in the restraint device or vehicle. Children are safest when the restraint is being used as designed and is properly installed. If it has been a while since you had your child safety seats inspected, contact the Sherwood Police Department and get a free child safety seat inspection. Details on our next free event are below.

3. Drive at a safe speed - Make no mistake, speed kills. The higher the speeds involved in a crash, the higher the risk of injury. The risks of driving fast far outweigh the benefits. Please resist any temptation to try getting there sooner by driving faster. It is much more effective, and safer, to leave an hour sooner.

4. Don't overdo it - Roadway fatigue has tragic consequences. Fatigue related crashes often involve head-on collisions and/or roll-overs. Rotate drivers on long trips and make sure somebody can help keep the driver alert by talking, and take a break if you need one. It would be better to lose a night of travel, then to be involved in a crash.

Our next free Car-Seat Check-Up Event is Saturday July 27th from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm, at the Sherwood Police Department. To ensure correct installation and faster service, please read and bring your car seat instructions and vehicle owner's manual. A certified technician will help parents and caregivers learn how to install and use their child restraints properly. Each car seat check will take about 30 minutes.
