FEATURED PARTNER: SHERWOOD HELPING HANDS

Helping Hands is a Sherwood community food bank offering assistance to those in need. It was started 27 years ago and has evolved in size and scope over the years, serving hundreds of families annually in the local area with food boxes containing non-perishable food, fresh dairy, meat and produce. Helping Hands also administers a "backpack" weekend meal program to children in the Sherwood school district. Kids in the free or reduced meal program are eligible to receive a backpack full of nourishing "kid friendly" food on Friday afternoons for themselves and their siblings for their weekend breakfast and lunch meals.



This program is monitored by the local school counselors. Over 100 kids are being served each weekend in the various grade and middle schools in the dis-

trict. This past summer Helping Hands partnered with the Kumon Learning Center and the YMCA to furnish lunch for their "Lunch and Learning" children's tutoring program.

Gerry and Dottie Edy serve as co-directors for Helping Hands. They have served in this capacity for the past 12 years, and are supported by a dedicated core of volunteers that help out each week. "We couldn't do this without our volunteers," says Dottie Edy. "They help us to collect, sort and distribute food weekly and make all of this happen."

"In addition to our volunteers we couldn't undertake this work without our financial sponsors," adds Gerry Edy. "Several local businesses and service organizations contribute to this charity, and we owe a special thanks to the organizers of the Give n' Gobble annual Thanksgiving run for their generous support."

Next month kicks off the coming year's food drives. You can support Helping Hands by donating food items to the church groups, scouts and service clubs when they come to your door collecting food donations. You can also support Helping Hands by running or walking in the Give n' Gobble 5k or 10k run on Thanksgiving Day.

MAYOR UPDATES

Another busy month lies ahead in November and I want to make sure our residents mark some important dates. It is the city's honor to host the fourth annual Veteran's Day event, November 11th at 11:00 am in the Sherwood Center for the Arts to thank our many veterans within the community who have selflessly served our nation. As in past years, the event will include a series of guest speakers, including myself and our State Senator Kim Thatcher.

On Saturday, November 14th at 11:00 am, with much anticipation, we will be cutting the ribbon on our Snyder Dog Park facility! The park has been completed for a number of weeks, but in order to ensure that the grass was firmly established before the paws hit the ground running, we pushed out the opening until November 14th.

I have had a couple of inquiries about the City Manager's decision to disallow certain groups continued use of the Sherwood Recreational Facility as operated by the YMCA and so I wanted to clarify some misinformation that has been circulating. The groups that will no longer be able to meet at this city facility (some religious based, some not) did not meet the parameters of

use as outlined in the contract with the YMCA. The terms of the contract are interpreted by our City Attorney and administered by our City Manager. At no time did the City Council vote to remove groups from being able to meet in city facilities. The City Manager also did not suggest that these groups were not welcome to continue meeting in city facilities, just not in this facility due to the constraints of the contract. The city is in no way discouraging these groups from continuing to meet, only that they relocate their location. The city would welcome any and all groups into many of our other equally comfortable, community focused buildings - such as the Senior Center, the Police Station or the new Center for the Arts. I know that I am extremely thankful that we are privileged enough to live in a city where there are multiple options where citizens can meet and build community. The City values all of our varied organizations that make Sherwood a community that works together, plays together and grows together. We are blessed indeed!

COUNCIL CORNER

Dan King, City Councilor

My family and I moved to Sherwood back in 1997 when the population was just over 8,000 people. This town has seen its share of changes since then as our number of residents is now approaching 20,000 people. One thing won't change - people will continue to move here because it is a safe community, an ideal place to raise a family and a beautiful place to live. As a City Councilor, I would like to see Sherwood develop areas inside of the city boundaries so that we can control the standards and designs and ensure that any development provides for adequate infrastructure and greenspace. I believe citizens should vote to add the property encompassed by the Brookman annexation to our current city limits to allow us to continue to grow in a slow, measured, and thoughtful manner.

Another issue I would like to touch on briefly is the HOAs that operate within our city boundaries. HOAs can legally control what you do with your property. A developer forms an association when they build a neighborhood, and residents join that association when they sign a legally binding contract upon buying a home. Proponents of homeowners associations say the groups use rules and regulations to protect home values and curb appeal, while opponents say HOAs are poorly regulated and have little or no oversight. I have had a number of constituents approach me to discuss issues with their HOAs in Sherwood. Since there is no governing body that oversees HOAs, I believe Sherwood should take steps to allow the City to do so. WORKING SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES

October is Fire Prevention Month, and TVF&R wants to remind you to check your smoke alarms. It's important to "hear the beep where you sleep" and make sure every bedroom has a working smoke alarm. The majority of people who die in a fire succumb to heat and smoke inhalation, not flames. Having working smoke alarms in your home greatly increases your chances of surviving a fire.

Fire is nothing like what you see on television or in the movies. It produces dark and deadly smoke that can fill your home in minutes, and can confuse you to the point that you never make it out. That is why every firefighter wears an air pack before entering a burning building and uses thermal imagers to search for victims.

Most fatal fires happen at night when people are sleeping. Working smoke alarms are designed to activate early to help ensure that you and your family have time to safely escape from your home.

TVF&R offers the following advice to help protect your family:

- To ensure maximum protection, install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Check your alarms monthly by pushing the test button and replace smoke alarms 10 years old or older.
- Hard-wired alarms-those wired directly into home electrical systems, should have a battery back-up.
- Never disconnect or remove batteries from smoke alarms.
- An alarm's hush button allows you to temporarily silence the alarm.
- Develop and practice a fire escape plan with the entire family that includes designating a meeting place outside.
- If your smoke alarm sounds, immediately exit your

home, call 911, and stay outside.

Oregon law requires working smoke alarms in all rental dwellings. If you rent and do not have working smoke alarms, contact your landlord or property manager. If working smoke alarms are not installed after you have notified your landlord or property manager, call TVF&R at 503.649.8577. Smoke alarms are also available for people who are deaf or hard of hearing. These alarms use strobe lights or vibration to alert residents. A Word About Signs

As the summer and election season winds down, we have received a number of questions about portable signs on both public and private property. Below are some common questions the Police Department and Planning Department receive about portable signs.

What kind of sign can I place on my property?

- A-frame portable signs are limited to no greater than four (4) feet in height and seven (7) square feet per sign face. An A-frame sign is composed of two (2) sign boards attached at the top and separated at the bottom, (to form an "A" shape)
- Portable signs attached to a stake or wire frame are limited to 24 inches in height and a sign face no larger than 18 inches by 24 inches in size
- How many signs can I have?
- Up to four portable signs are allowed per lot on residentially zoned properties.
- One portable sign is allowed per business in any commercial complex.

Where can I put the sign(s)?

- Portable signs are not allowed in the public right-of-way except from Friday at 6:00 am until

Sunday at 6:00 pm. Otherwise, portable signs must be placed on private property.

Do I need a permit?

Portable signs do not require a permit from the City. This is just a very brief summary of some of the regulations and does not address "temporary signs" which have different size, location and number restrictions than portable signs. The specific code regulating portable signs is located in Chapter 16.102 of the Sherwood Municipal Code, which is available on-line. Did you Shakeout?

On the morning of October 15th, many Sherwood residents and businesses participated in the Shakeout event. This annual event had the highest number of participants ever here in Oregon with over 530,000 participants. Preparation for earthquakes in critical since Oregon lies at a convergent continental boundary where two tectonic plates are colliding. The Cascadia Subduction Zone is a 600 mile long fault stretching from offshore northern California to southern British Columbia. This fault builds up stress for hundreds of years as the Juan de Fuca and North America Plates push against each other. Eventually, the two plates rip apart, creating some of the largest earthquakes and tsunamis on earth. Where the Juan de Fuca oceanic plate and the North American continental plate meet is called a subduction zone, because the denser Juan de Fuca Plate is being pulled under North America. The Juan de Fuca Plate is moving to the northeast at about an inch a year as the North American Plate moves west. The Oregon coastline is actually bulging upward from the two plates pushing against each other. For more information on how to prepare, check out the website at www.shakeout.org/oregon.



Sherwood West Pre-Concept Plan

Thank you to all of our community members that have taken the time to learn about the Sherwood West Project, a preliminary concept plan for a 1,291-acre Metro-designated Urban Reserve area west of Sherwood, and to provide comments on how our community could grow over the next 50 years. Based on the input we have received from the public at numerous events and on-line surveys as well as information provided at the June, July and September Community and Technical Advisory Committee meetings, the project team has created the Draft Hybrid Plan.

Please know that there is still time to make your voice heard:

- An on-line community survey was launched on October 8, 2015 to gather public comments on the draft plan through October 30, 2015. Paper surveys are also available at City Hall.
- Make plans to join us at a Community Open House on October 22, 2015 at the Sherwood Center for the Arts from 6:00 to 8:00 pm to learn more about the Preliminary Concept Plan and share your ideas.
- The next Community Advisory Committee meeting is scheduled for November 19, 2015 at Sherwood City Hall from 6:30-8:30 pm.

Cedar Creek Trail Project is Underway!

The Cedar Creek Trail, a 10-12 foot wide, paved multi-use path and part of the Metro Regional Ice Age Tonquin Trail, a 15-mile master planned trail that will one day pass through Wilsonville, Tualatin, Sherwood and parts of Washington and Clackamas County has begun. Sherwood received a

\$5.6 million Regional Flexible Fund federal grant for design and construction of portions of the Cedar Creek Trail. Since the Cedar Creek Trail project is at various stages of development, the trail is divided into two segments or projects. Project 1 will design and construct the portion that starts at the eastern edge of Sherwood, follows Oregon Street into Old Town, connects with the existing trail in Stella Olsen Park along the Cedar Creek corridor and heads north under Washington Street and along the creek to the intersection of Highway 99W and SW Meinecke. Project 2 will determine the alignment within the Cedar Creek corridor north of Highway 99W to Roy Rogers Road. Ultimately, the intention is to connect the trail to the Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge western parking area, just outside of our city limits.

The project is being guided by input to the Parks Board from a Technical Advisory Committee (comprised of stakeholder regional agencies), a Local Trail Advisory Committee (comprised of local citizens appointed by Council) and you! Public input is critical to ensure that the design construction and alignment of the trail takes into consideration opportunities and concerns identified by the community.

Please come and learn more about the Cedar Creek Trail at an Open House on October 29th from 6:30 pm to 8:00 pm in the Community Room at City Hall. You will be able to take a first look at the preliminary design of Project 1 (Oregon to 99W) and comment on the opportunities and constraints and screening criteria for Project 2 (99W to Roy Rogers) alignment.

City Business License and Renewal Reminder

As we get close to the end of 2015, it is time to remind everyone that owns or operates a business in Sherwood that they will need to obtain or renew their business license. Anyone conducting business for profit in Sherwood, no matter the type of business or home business, is required have a current business license. Construction Contractors Board (CCB) Licensed Contractors, with a METRO License, are not required to obtain a City of Sherwood Business License unless their home office is located in Sherwood. Current business licenses will expire on December 31, 2015. You are required to renew your license on or before the expiration date. By renewing before January 1, 2016 you will also avoid late fees. To ensure that you are not contacted for follow-up if you are no longer operating a business in Sherwood, please notify us of Non-Renewal.



Curbside Leaf Pick-up Program Approaches

Beginning in November and continuing into December, the City's Public Works crews will be out in your neighborhoods collecting leaves. The Curbside Leaf Pick-up Program helps reduce flooding caused by leaves clogging the storm drains. Please review the flyer inserted in your Utility bill or visit www.sherwoodoregon.gov/publicworks for more details and dates.

To experience the full benefit of the program and assist the crews in collecting as many leaves as possible, we ask that you follow these guidelines:

- Please have loose leaves at curbside on the first day of your scheduled pick up area. Leaves that have been trampled or crushed by traffic or have been sitting for a long time cannot be picked-up by the machinery and will be left.
- Loose leaves, if placed in the street, should be raked into rows instead of a single pile and must be 12" away from the curb to allow for water drainage to the storm drains.
- Crews will not walk onto private property to retrieve leaves.
- We ask citizens to not use bags for curbside pick-up.
- There will be no curbside pickup on Private Streets.
- To be most efficient, we ask citizens not to park vehicles or place refuse/recycling bins on or near leaves at curb.

The equipment is big and bulky and cannot reach tight areas between obstacles. In the event that your leaves are raked to the street after we complete your area it will be your responsibility to dispose of the leaves either at our Central Drop Day or by other means. The City's street sweeper will not pick-up piles left behind.

As in past years, we will have a Central Drop Day in early December. Please bring your leaves and 2 or more cans of non-perishable food for the local food bank to the main Public Works facility located at 15527 SW Willamette Street on Saturday, December 5th from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm.

Please be advised that piles of leaves in the street are tempting to young kids to play in and motorists to drive through. Parents, please inform your children of the dangers of playing in or around roadways at all times and encourage street smarts and safety with your family and neighbors.
