GOT FIREWORKS? KEEP IT LEGAL. KEEP IT SAFE!

Oregon law bans fireworks that fly, explode, or travel on the ground more than six feet — this includes bottle rockets, roman candles, firecrackers and M80s. To be legal, purchase all fireworks at a licensed Oregon fire-works stand. Fireworks purchased by mail order or in the state of Washington or at Native American reservations may be illegal in our state.

Under Oregon law, officials can seize illegal fireworks, and you can be fined up to \$500 per violation and/or arrested. You can be held civilly liable for damages resulting from improper use of any fireworks — legal or illegal. Oregon law also makes parents liable for damage caused by their children and allows fire departments to charge for the cost of suppressing fires caused by fireworks.

Additionally, the use of illegal fireworks constitutes criminal activity, and your insurance policy may not cover you if you engage in a criminal act that results in damage.

Even legal fireworks are dangerous and have caused injuries and burns to users, especially unsupervised children. Also, during dry summer conditions, an errant firework can ignite vegetation, vehicles and even your roof.

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue advises you to celebrate safely this year by following the following safety tips:

- Only adults should light or handle fireworks.
- Supervise children at all times when fireworks are being used.
- Store fireworks, matches, and lighters out of the reach of children.
- Use fireworks outdoors on a paved surface — away from buildings, vehicles and vegetation.
- Never point or throw fireworks at people, pets or buildings.
- Never alter fireworks or make your own. Homemade explosives can be deadly!

- Have a hose or bucket of water nearby to douse mis-fired and spent fireworks and to extinguish potential fires.

We're Prepared-Are You?

As many of you may know your local government recently participated in the Cascadia Rising earthquake simulation. Sherwood staff and volunteers spent two days in June simulating a 9.0 Cascadia subduction zone earthquake. The Sherwood Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was in action for both days and the exercise included loss of all power, loss of all communications, moderate to heavy structural damage, significant impact to basic services like water and sewer and moderate to heavy casualties including loss of life.



Your City staff is dedicated to staying prepared to offer our best response to any natural disaster, but an event of this magnitude will stretch all of us to our limits. The experts tell us it isn't a matter of IF, but rather WHEN an earthquake of this magnitude will occur off of the Oregon/Washington coast.

It is imperative that all of Sherwood be prepared because resources will be stretched beyond thin and will be focused only on the most critical of life safety issues and on restoration of critical infrastructure. In order to be better prepared take these basic steps:

1. Identify the different types of hazards you should prepare for
2. Learn how the hazards can impact your family
3. Identify steps you can take to minimize or prevent the impact of hazards
4. Identify the equipment and supplies you will need to survive
5. Develop a plan
6. Practice the plan

Experts tell us that a good start is to prepare a 72-hour kit for yourself and members of your family, but they also tell us you will need stored supplies for up to two weeks during a significant hazard such as a 9.0 earthquake.

A few weeks ago, I came across photographs of a recent tree planting at our Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge. I searched for one photo that showed my daughter and her friend planting a tree, with the intention of saving it along with the thousands of photos every parent has in this age of well-documented lives. I found that photo...and in my search for that particular photo, I made a small discovery. In every photo I searched I saw faces of children, teens, adults, and seniors smiling, even when they were focused on planting and not on the camera. The camera had captured the satisfaction and joy each person felt doing something for the greater good, for the environment, for others, and for themselves.

A few weeks later, I had a similar experience, this time it came in the form of a 10' x 8' wood box built around a utility gator! It took two solid months of long nights and weekends, team work and many dedicated volunteers to turn this box into an award-winning mini-float entry into the Rose Festival Grand Floral Parade. And in every photo (well almost!) volunteers were smiling, enjoying the camaraderie, making new friends while doing something for the greater good.

On June 9th, I had the opportunity to visit the Emergency Operations Center at the Police Station where I found a beehive of activity as our City staff practiced emergency protocols in the event of a Cascadia Subduction zone earthquake. In the back corner of a menagerie of computers, white boards, and dried food sam-

ples, I found two volunteer HAM radio operators, positioned ready to relay valuable information should the unthinkable occur. They were smiling and really relishing the entire activity as they volunteered for the greater good.

That same week, I came home late from a Council meeting and as I drove down Washington Street adjacent to Stella Olsen Park, I drove past volunteer orchestra members for My Fair Lady loading up their cars after an evening practice. While they weren't exactly smiling (it was 10:30 pm, of course!); but I KNOW they felt satisfied from a successful night's practice. After all, an orchestra is almost by definition a perfect example of a single participant involved for the greater good of the whole.

There are hundreds and hundreds of volunteers in our community who have discovered the power of giving of themselves for the greater good of the whole. When you visit one of our festivals such as the Sherwood Robin Hood Festival, Cruisin' Sherwood, or the Altered Arts Festival what you are enjoying is made possible in large part by volunteers. PLANNING NEWS Cedar Creek Trail Update

Over the past ten months, we have been busy working on the design and alignment for the Cedar Creek Trail, a \$5.6 million Regional Flexible Fund grant project. The southern segment is a twelve foot paved pathway about two miles long and is being designed now with construction planned for 2017. This portion starts along Oregon Street, heads through Old Town and connects with the existing trail in Stella Olsen Park and heads north along the Cedar Creek corridor to the intersection of Highway 99W and SW Meinecke.

The trail alignment for the northern segment is located within the Cedar Creek corridor between Highway 99W and Roy Rogers Road. Recently, our local trail committee (LTAC) and the Parks Advisory Board endorsed the alignment for Cedar Creek Trail that is shown below. Our consultant team will now begin the design work and prepare preliminary cost estimates. Ultimately, we will ask for Council approval of this alignment and if approved, seek funding sources for construction of this segment. PLANNING NEWS CONTINUED Recreational Marijuana Facilities

At the direction of City Council, the Planning Commission and Police Advisory Board are currently working on developing rules for recreational marijuana facilities. In January, City Council agreed to place the issue of permanently banning recreational marijuana facilities within our city limits on the November 2016 ballot for Sherwood voters to decide. The Council also decided to place an added 3% tax on all sales from recreational marijuana facilities in Sherwood should the ban not be approved by voters. Only Sherwood voters can decide whether a permanent ban will be in place after November. The City Council does however want us to be prepared with recreational marijuana facilities rules in case voters give the OK for allowing these facilities in Sherwood. The ban does not impact medical marijuana dispensaries which are allowed in the industrial zones.

This spring, the Planning Commission and Police Advisory Board met with interested citizens to develop rules concerning recreational marijuana facilities. An online survey ran during the month of March to get feedback on where people thought that the facilities should be allowed under our zoning code. We also discussed adding additional regulations concerning time, place and manner beyond the state rules for facilities.

Based on the public input that we received so far, we have developed a draft of proposed local rules concerning recreational marijuana facilities for Sherwood should the permanent ban fail. We are looking for your comments on the proposed regulations before the Public Hearing with the Planning Commission scheduled for July 26, 2016. You can also comment in person at the hearing.

After the Planning Commission makes a recommendation on the rules, the proposed regulations will go before the City Council who will make the ultimate decision on the rules. Sherwood Tannery Site Assessment

The Frontier Leather Co. was in operation from 1947 to 1988. To prepare hides for sale, they were tanned using chromium before being split into halves. The valuable halves of the hides were sold and the less valuable "hide splits" were buried on-site. Tannery operations also included wastewater treatment in two 3.4-acre sedimentation lagoons. Water treatment sludge was buried on-site with the hide splits. The site has been left contaminated and unable to be redeveloped without being cleaned up.

The Tannery Brownfield Site Assessment is focusing on two of the six parcels that comprise the former tannery (the other sites have already been assessed). The City is interested in acquiring the two lots totaling approximately 25 acres to facilitate clean up and redevelopment of the developable portions of this vacant industrial property. One possibility the City is considering is to relocate the public works yard from Old Town to this location.

An EPA grant will complete the assessment of impacts from the tannery's operations, allowing the City to develop cleanup alternatives, estimate cleanup costs and better understand the potential liability and cost impacts it would assume if the property is acquired by the City.

The Consultant team has been working over the past year to develop and get approval for an assessment plan, conducted the assessment and has analyzed the results. We are now ready to share the results of the assessment and begin discussing next steps and clean up options. NOVEMBER ELECTION DEADLINES APPROACH

Candidates for the position of Mayor and three City Councilor positions will appear on the ballot for the November 8, 2016 General Election. The Mayor's term is a two year term and City Councilor terms are a four year term. Those elected will serve from January 1, 2017 through December 31 of their respective term limit and upon taking an Oath of Office, scheduled for the 1st City Council meeting in January.

To be eligible to run for election a candidate is required to be a registered voter, at least 18 years of age, and reside within the city for at least one year

immediately before election or appointment to office. Persons interested in running for office can obtain a Candidate's Packet from below or at Sherwood City Hall at 22560 SW Pine Street. Interested persons can file for candidacy by presenting a Declaration of Candidacy and a State of Oregon Candidate Filing Form SEL 101 which are included in the Candidate's Packet, and by paying a \$10 filing fee or in lieu of the filing fee, submitting a petition for candidacy signed by 20 registered Sherwood voters. If filing by petition, a petition must be certified by the City Recorder prior to circulation.

Contact the Oregon Secretary of State Elections division for the current petition forms and requirements.

The filing period for interested candidates began on June 1, 2016 and concludes at 5:00 pm on August 30, 2016. Visit the Oregon Secretary of State, Elections Division website for current Candidate's Manual, Campaign Finance Manual and other election information.


Movies in the Park Planned for August

Water Quality Report Available!

The City of Sherwood is proud to deliver water to more than 19,000 people each and every day. We think it is important for our customers to understand where their water comes from, how safe it is, and what actions we take to ensure its continuing safety. Efficient Outdoor Water Use

How much water to use outside during the warm summer months is sometimes difficult to gauge. Lawns, trees, shrubs, flowers and garden vegetables all require different amounts of water. Just soaking everything a couple times a week may seem simple but is often a waste of the resources and will add-up on your utility bill.

Instead, please review these simple steps that will make more efficient, and not less effective, your outdoor water usage.

1. Get your Weekly Watering Number - the Regional Water Providers Consortium provide a weekly number in inches of how much water your yard needs based upon the weather. Based upon forecasts and historical data the Weekly Watering Number assists you in not over watering your landscape. Sign-up for a weekly email or check it whenever you want at www.conserveh2o.org
2. Timing is everything - Watering our lawns and gardens is best in the mornings before 10:00 am and in the evenings after 6:00 pm. In the middle of the day when the temperatures are warmer and the winds are higher we might lose a lot of water to evaporation rather than soil absorption.
3. Aiming is important, too - There is no point in soaking the sidewalk, driveway and streets with water on a hot day. Take the time to properly aim your sprinkler heads so that a majority of the water hits your intended target.
4. Check for leaks - Regularly check your outdoor system for leaks. This can be a challenge since the water lost is likely underground. Yet an ignored leak can be very costly. Consult a landscaper to assist you with regular maintenance and repairs.
