

## Placing a sign this Spring or Summer?

Check out this quick guide to Temporary, Portable, and Banner Signs Regulations in the

sage, it's important to follow local sign regulations to ensure safety, visibility, and compliance with the City's zoning code. The following overview breaks down what types of signs are allowed, where they can be placed, and any permits you might need.

These are short-term signs often used for events or sales. In residential zones, they can be up to 6 feet tall and 3 feet wide, with a maximum sign face of 6 square feet per side. They must use a colonial post style and may include one small rider. In all other zones, they can be up to 8.5 feet tall and 4 feet wide, with sign faces up to 32 square feet.

Typically, only one temporary sign is allowed per lot. These signs are not permitted

## Portable Signs

Portable signs include A-frames and staked signs that can be moved easily. Residential lots can have up to four, while larger nonresidential properties can place one every 50 feet of street frontage. Most zones limit businesses to one portable sign.

Portable signs may only be placed in the public right-of-way between Friday at 6:00 a.m. and Sunday at 6:00 p.m. (or through Monday evening if it's a federal holiday). They must be freestanding, not attached to structures or vegetation, and placed at least 25 feet apart. Signs also require permission if placed adjacent to someone else's

In the Old Town Overlay District, businesses with a Sherwood license may display up to two portable signs without a permit, including in the right-of-way, as long as they have the property owner's permission and follow placement guidelines.

#### Banner Signs

### Violations

Each day a sign violates the code is treated as a separate offense. Illegally placed signs in the right-of-way can be confiscated by the city and held for 10 business days. If not retrieved, they'll be disposed of.

Temporary Signs

Banner signs are flexible signs attached to buildings. They must be mounted securely to a building side, not fences, rooftops, or vehicles, and must avoid covering windows. Banners must be in good condition-no fading, fraying, or drooping-and made of all-

### General Rules for All Signs

Q. What are some of your favorite things about working for the city?


A. Serving the Sherwood community! I am so grateful to serve such a supportive community, with the bonus of working with amazing people. Q. What are some typical challenges of this position?



#### A Night of Celebration, Vision, and Purpose

On Wednesday, April 16, Sherwood came together for our annual State of the City event - a vibrant evening that showcased not only the pride and unity of our community but also our shared vision for the future. Held at the Sherwood Center for the Arts and kicked off with incredible performances by our Sherwood High School Drumline.

#### Vision-Driven Leadership: Council Goals for 2025 and Beyond

Each year, the City Council holds a visioning and goal-setting session where we align our goals and values. This session lays the foundation for everything we do, from budgeting to program development. Our 2025-26 goals reaffirm our commitment to fiscal responsibility, transparency in government, community engagement, and innovation.

Economic Development promotes diverse growth opportunities and attracts businesses that bring family-wage jobs to Sherwood. The goal is to enable residents to live and work in the community they call home, while also diversifying our tax base.

Infrastructure supports safe and connected growth by investing in key pedestrian connectors, expanding broadband access, and planning for critical public facilities. These projects ensure long-term sustainability and improve quality of life.

Livability aims to enhance community wellbeing by supporting diverse housing options, promoting walkability, and trails. Robust programming at our Senior Center and the Sherwood Arts Center. It's about creating a place where all residents can thrive.

These goals are anchored by our mission to deliver high-quality services to everyone in our community through strong relationships and a commitment to innovation.

## Major Highlights: Progress in Every Direction

Sherwood is on the move. Among our standout achievements is the Sherwood West Expansion. We've brought 1,200 acres of new land into our urban growth boundary opening the door to housing diversity, job growth, parks, and protected natural areas. Approximately 500 acres will be preserved for trails and open space. At the same time, specialty zoning will enable affordable housing and cottage clusters, allowing residents of all life stages to find their place here.

The much-anticipated pedestrian bridge connecting the YMCA to Sherwood High School is expected to be substantially complete by September. It's not just about safety-it's about uniting East and West Sherwood.

We were able to fund the cost of this bridge through outside funding sources, including lottery and tax increment financing. The bottom line is that we could do this without raising taxes or fees or compromising other future plans.

2025 marks the 10th anniversary of the Sherwood Center for the Arts, which wel comed over 41,000 visitors last year. Meanwhile, the Sherwood Public Library hosted over 400 events and facilitated more than 450,000 checkouts, a 5% increase from the previous year. At the Marjorie Stewart Senior Center, we served over 17,000 meals, expanded mental health services, and launched a popular senior shuttle-complete with spa day excursions.

Despite headwinds such as increased healthcare and PERS costs, our city's finances are strong and transparent. We have also secured over \$24 million in state and federal grants, including \$12.5 million for broadband expansion, \$5 million for the tannery site cleanup, and \$3 million for employment area infrastructure. \$4M for the pedestrian bridge and more.



Did you know that we have a dedicated officer to respond to behavioral health calls? The Mental Health Response Team (MHRT) is a team made up of a master's level crisis clinician and a law enforcement officer. Together, they respond to 9-1-1 calls that have a behavioral health component, and the team can respond anywhere within Washington County. The crisis clinician comes from the Mental Health Crisis Team at Lifeworks

Lifeworks Northwest has a team of over 700 employees that includes PhDs, License Clinical Social Workers (LCSW), Registered Nurses (RN), Medical Doctors (MDs), and more, who are experienced mental health professionals and addiction specialists with a range of cultural, educational, and training backgrounds.

All Oregon police officers receive crisis intervention training during the police academy and at their home department, but those on MHRT receive much more advanced training. The clinicians receive training in police radio communications and attend defensive tactics training. Clinical staff also wear a ballistic vest at all times while riding with officers, as they may be exposed to volatile and dangerous situations.

MHRT has been serving people within Washington County for several years and was the first of its kind in the nation when it was created. It's not uncommon for individuals suffering from mental illness or in an emotional crisis to come in contact with law enforcement. This unique program provides a rapid response of optimum care to those in need. Services include face-to-face crisis assessment and evaluation, consolation with families and other professionals, psychiatric consultation, hospital diversion, referrals for medication evaluation, stabilization of services and follow-up care, flexible funding to assist with emergency housing, referrals to appropriate services, and transportation or other unmet needs contributing to the crisis episode.

HELP SHAPE YOUR COMMUNITY

In mid-2021, the South Cities area funded a dedicated team to focus on our area. The MHRT South Cities Team operates through an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between Washington County and the cities of Tigard, Tualatin, Sherwood, and King City. The goal of the MHRT South Cities Team was to dedicate one clinician exclusively to Sherwood, Tualatin, Tigard, and King City between the hours of 11:00 a.m. and 11:00

Lifeworks NW's Clinician Crystal Fischer rotates every two weeks to a different city, partnering in Sherwood with Police Officer A. Lawrence, Tigard Officer K. Gregson, and Tualatin Officer S. Fischer. Regardless of the schedule, the team may be assigned crisis calls throughout the South Cities region as needed. When the South Cities Team isn't working, a team with the Washington County Sheriff's Office covers the whole

The team responds to calls that come through 911 or the non-emergency line that have anything to do with mental health. It could be anything from family members concerned about someone being in danger or someone is calling in just wanting some help. Some calls are more severe; a suicide attempt or someone needing immediate medical attention.

Law enforcement in general, responds to so many mental health calls and officers only have so many resources. So having a clinician to respond with an officer to someone in crisis is so beneficial. The clinician can not only do the assessments in the field, but connect them with specific resources and even health insurance. The clinicians have access to so many things right away that officers simply do not.
