GOT FIREWORKS? KEEP IT LEGAL, KEEP IT SAFE!

Oregon law bans fireworks that fly, explode, or travel on the ground more than six feet — this includes bottle rockets, roman candles, firecrackers, and M80s.

To be legal, purchase all fireworks at a licensed Oregon fireworks stand. Fireworks purchased by mail order or in the State of Washington or at Native American reservations may be illegal in our state.

Under Oregon law, officials can seize illegal fireworks, and you can be fined up to \$500 per violation and/or arrested. You can be held civilly liable for damages resulting from improper use of any fireworks — legal or illegal. Oregon law also makes parents liable for damage caused by their children and allows fire departments to charge for the cost of suppressing fires caused by fireworks. Additionally, the use of illegal fireworks constitutes criminal activity, and your insurance policy

may not cover you if you engage in a criminal act that results in damage.

Even legal fireworks are dangerous and have caused injuries and burns to users, especially unsupervised children. Also, during dry summer conditions, an errant firework can ignite vegetation, vehicles, and even your roof.

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue advises you to celebrate safely this year by following the below safety tips:

- Only adults should light or handle fireworks.
- Supervise children at all times when fireworks are being used.
- Store fireworks, matches, and lighters out of the reach of children.
- Use fireworks outdoors on a paved surface, away from buildings, vehicles, and vegetation.
- Never point or throw fireworks at people, pets, or buildings.

State of Oregon Firework Chart / Illegal Fireworks

Any fireworks that fall into the air, explode or behave in an uncontrollable and unpredictable manner. Warning label may say "Shock Sensitive" or "Do Not Throw". Oregon law prohibits / (DO NOT THROW) / (DO NOT THROW)

The items below are considered illegal explosive devices and should only be handled by a bomb technician.

Summer is quickly approaching and we are gearing up for another exciting Cruisin, Robin Hood Festival and National Night Out, as well as many other fun community events. In addition to all of this, we also have some other exciting work taking place.

We are looking forward to completing the first-ever operations and staffing study for the police department. This will include contracting with an outside consultant to determine community value and satisfaction, perform a workload analysis, patrol operational analysis, supervision operational analysis and support services operational analysis. The results will be used to determine the current and future staffing needs of the police department. In addition, the Police Advisory Board (PAB) has been having conversations with their neighbors and fellow community members about the types and levels of policing the community expects and desires, and that information will be provided to the consultants as a part of the operations and staffing study.

The PAB includes nine volunteers; members of our community who are freely investing their time

to help shape the future of law enforcement in Sherwood. They are to be commended, as are the members of all the boards and commissions, for their hard work.

In my tenure as your Police Chief, I have always sought out and welcomed outside review and input; this includes the department's first-ever accreditation process and awards, the department's first-ever CIS Best Practices reviews, and now the department's first-ever police operations and staffing study and I am excited for the work to be completed.

We also continue to look for ways we can be engaged with the community. As a part of these efforts we have recently launched a smartphone application that will allow us to push information out to the community, and allow the community to provide crime tips and feedback. It is called the Sherwood PD app and it can be found on all three app stores.

Finally, please remember that the low crime rate and livability we have in Sherwood is no accident. It is the return on investment (ROI) you get for providing stable, sustainable funding for law enforce-

ment and we appreciate your support.

Speaking of Growth

From 2000-2013, Sherwood grew by an estimated 6,612 people, making it one of the fastest growing communities in the State. According to the Portland State Population Research Center, during 2013, Washington County added one new person per hour and Sherwood alone added about 380 residents. While it may seem to some that the City is growing too fast, the demand for new housing continues across the region and Sherwood remains a popular choice for many. The City conducted a Housing Needs Analysis (HNA) that evaluated our residential land and housing inventory. The HNA found that there are approximately 96 buildable, residentially zoned acres remaining within the current City limits, and another 79 buildable residential acres within the Brookman area. Other takeaways from the report include:

- Sherwood is attracting younger people and households with children. In 2010, the median age in Sherwood was 34.3 years old, compared to Washington County's median age of 35.3 years and the State median of 38.4. Sherwood has a larger share of households with children (47% of households), compared with Washington County (33%) or the Portland Region (29%). The Millennial generation—those born roughly between 1980-2000—are the largest age group in Oregon and will account for the majority of household growth in Sherwood over the next 20 years.

- The aging of the population is likely to result in increased demand for smaller single-family housing, multifamily housing, and housing specifically for seniors. The growth of younger and diversified households is likely to result in increased demand for a wider variety of affordable housing appropriate for families with children, such as small single-family housing, townhouses, duplexes, and multifamily housing.

- Sherwood households have relatively higher income, which affects the type of housing that is affordable. Income is a key determinant of housing choice. Sherwood's median household income is (\$78,400), more than 20% higher than the rest of Washington County

Sherwood's housing stock is predominantly single-family detached. About 75% is single-family detached, 8% is single-family attached, and 18% is multifamily in Sherwood.

- Almost three quarters of Sherwood's residents own their homes. Homeownership rates in Sherwood are above Washington County (54%), the Portland region (60%), and Oregon (62%) averages.

- Homeownership costs increased in Sherwood, consistent with national trends. Median sales prices for homes in Sherwood increased by about 30% between 2004 and 2014, from about \$245,000 to \$316,500.

- More than one-third of Sherwood's households have housing affordability problems. Thirty-eight percent of Sherwood's households were cost-burdened (i.e., paid more than 30% of their income on rent or homeownership costs). Renters were more likely to be cost-burdened compared to homeowners in Sherwood.

- The forecast in Sherwood is considerably below historical growth rates. Metro's forecast for new housing in Sherwood shows that households will grow at less than 1% per year. In comparison, Sherwood's population grew at 3.4% per year between 2000 and 2013 and 8% per year between 1990 and 2013. If Sherwood grows faster than Metro's forecast during the next twenty years, then Sherwood will not have sufficient land to accommodate growth.

Proposed Backyard Chickens Regulations Moving Forward

Last month, the Sherwood Planning Commission held a work session to review proposed Code amendments regulating backyard chickens. This was done at the request of the City Council. At that work session, the Planning Commission looked at the comments received from a survey on chickens. That survey resulted in a tremendous response with over 535 responses. Keeping in mind that this survey was "not scientific", most people who took the survey supported a change in the current backyard chicken policy. Many felt that some restrictions to prohibit roosters and to allow a certain number of chickens in our residential neighborhoods were in order. The Planning Commission provided direction to

staff to prepare draft regulations and proceed with public notice so that a public hearing could be held on proposed development Code amendments. To review the survey results along with the proposed Code regulations, please visit: www.sherwoodoregon.gov/planning/page/backyard-chickens

This is your first opportunity to let the Commission know your position on the issue and the proposed regulations. You can provide your comments in writing before the hearing or email millerm@sherwoodoregon.gov. You are also welcome to testify in person at the hearing on July 14, 2015. After the Planning Commission hearing, they will forward a recommendation on the Code language to the City Council who will ultimately decide the issue. 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

Water Quality Report is Available

The City of Sherwood is proud to deliver water to more than 18,955 people every day. We think it is important for our customers to understand where their water comes from, how safe it is, and what actions we take to ensure its continuing safety. The current annual edition of the Water Quality Report is available online and by mail upon request.

Efficient Outdoor Water Use

How much water to use outside during the warm summer months is sometimes difficult to gauge. Lawns, trees, shrubs, flowers and garden vegetables all require different amounts of water. Just soaking everything a couple times a week may seem simple but is often a waste of the resources and will add-up on your utility bill.

Instead, please review these simple steps that will make more efficient, and not less effective, your outdoor water usage.

1. Get your Weekly Watering Number - the Regional Water Providers Consortium provide a weekly number in inches of how much water your yard needs based upon the weather. Based upon forecasts and historical data the Weekly Watering Number assists you in not over watering your landscape. Sign-up for a weekly email or check it whenever you want at www.conserveh2o.org

2. Timing is everything - Watering our lawns and gardens is best in the mornings before 10:00 am and in the evenings after 6:00 pm. In the middle of the day when the temperatures are warmer and the winds are higher we might lose a lot of water to evaporation rather than soil absorption.

3. Aiming is important, too - There is no point in soaking the sidewalk, driveway and streets with water on a hot day. Take the time to properly aim your sprinkler heads so that a majority of the water hits your intended target.

4. Check for leaks - Regularly check your outdoor system for leaks. This can be a challenge since the water lost is likely underground. Yet an ignored leak can be very costly. Consult a landscaper to assist you with regular maintenance and repairs.
