As the weather begins to warm up, we'd like to take the time to talk about three important summer safety topics.

May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month, which focuses on reminding vehicle drivers and motorcyclists that motorcycle safety is everyone's safety. We normally see more motorcycles on Oregon roadways during the summer months and statistically, they are twenty-eight times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in a motor vehicle crash and four times more likely to be injured.

motorcycles are smaller than most vehicles and difficult to see, it can cause drivers to misjudge their speed and distance. A motorcycle still has the same rights of the road as any other motorist, which means they always get the full width of a lane. It's important to take the extra time to check all mirrors and blind spots for motorcycles before changing lanes or merging with traffic. If you are driving behind a motorcycle, allow more follow distance between your vehicle in the motorcycle – beyond three to four seconds. This gives them time to stop or maneuver quickly in an emergency.

In 2020, the National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) reported that there were 5,579 motorcyclists killed in traffic crashes, which was a 14% increase from the year prior. With your diligence and attentiveness, you can help make Oregon roads safer for everyone.

Secondly, it's important to remember the dangers of leaving dogs or children unattended in a vehicle during the summer. When the outside temperature is 85 degrees, the vehicle can reach approximately 104 degrees in only ten minutes.

Temperatures inside a car increase by an average of 19 degrees in the first ten minutes – even in the shade.

> Owners can be charged with Animal Neglect if they leave their dog unattended in a hot vehicle. If you see a dog in distress, call the non-emergency number at 503.629.0111.

Finally, if you are planning on enjoying Oregon's beautiful lakes or rivers, it's super important to stay safe while doing so. Be sure to plan ahead by checking online resources for information pertaining that specific lake or river. You can visit boatoregon-It's important to yield for motorcyclists, especially while turning at intersections. Since geo.hub.arcgis.com for a detailed map that indicates current obstacles within rivers. Stay clear of partially submerged trees or limbs; strong currents can quickly carry you in, potentially leading to capsizing or entrapment. Fill out a float plan and print out a copy to let others know where you are going and when to expect your return. Most importantly, always wear your life jacket!

the oldest and unique events in Oregon, that began in 1954. Both medieval and modern, the Festival will fill the streets of Old Town Sherwood on the evening of July 14, and all day July 15, offering fun for all ages. Festival activities begin on Friday evening at 5:00 p.m. The Festival will include a vendor village with approximately 100 booths offering a wide variety of crafts, services, and food. There will be kids' crafts, activities, a beer, wine and cider garden, and more! One of the most unique sporting events in Oregon, The International Archery Match between Nottingham, England and Sherwood, Oregon, will take place on Saturday and Sunday at Sherwood High School. The Sylvan Archers, Inc. of Sherwood host and organize Sherwood's portion of this competition that was originated by the SRHFA in 1956. Community volunteers invest countless hours to create festival activities attracting 20,000+ attendees from near and far. Scheduled times for festival activities will be highlighted in the July Sherwood Gazette, and will be available at the festival souvenir booth and on our festival website, <u>www.robinhoodfestival.org</u>.

This year's festival will once again feature a continuous line-up of musical groups on the Main Stage, including Jennifer Batten and Full Steam on Friday night and including Nu Wavers and Hit Machine on Saturday. Entertainment for the entire family is planned on the Family Stage and on the grounds. Family Stage entertainment begins on Friday evening at 6:00 p.m. at Veterans' Park, with the traditional Knighting Ceremony. Each year several Sherwood area residents are selected to be honored for their service to the community. Over 400 have been knighted by Maid Marian in ceremonies spanning over three decades. The Sherwood Renaissance Singers begin singing at 5:45 p.m. Family entertainment and a Teen Dance follow. Local groups and entertainers are scheduled for Saturday on the Family Stage, including BJ the Clown and the Seattle Knights. Medieval entertainment and demonstrations will take place including those at the Medieval Village located on 1st Street adjacent to Veterans' Park.

The traditional and popular festival community parade will begin on Saturday at 10:00 a.m. at the SW Langer Farms Parkway roundabout, welcoming family-friendly entries from Sherwood and beyond. The parade will make its way to downtown Sherwood drawing a large number of spectators. This parade offers the perfect opportunity to show your community spirit with a creative entry commemorating "Merrie Olde Sherwood." Everyone loves a parade whether you are a participant or a spectator. Festival activities continue throughout the day. Residents are also encouraged to take part in the Castle Building Contest, demonstrating their creativity in their entries submitted for judging.

The SRHFA held the inaugural Madrigal Feast on April 15, where the 2023 Maid Marian and her Senior and Junior Courts were introduced. It was an evening full of wonderful entertainment and a delicious dinner. We want to thank the many sponsors, entertainers, attendees, and volunteers who took part in making this event a big success. Sherwood West Concept Plan Re-look Project

It is anticipated that the Sherwood West Concept Plan Re-look will wrap up in June/July. The Sherwood Planning Commission will make a recommendation to City Council which will then decide to accept the plan document.

The city has undertaken a two-year process to revisit the 2016 Sherwood West Preliminary Concept Pan. There have been significant changes in Sherwood and surrounding areas since the Preliminary Plan's approval:

- The Sherwood School District constructed the new 350,000 square-foot Sherwood High School on 70+ acres inside the Sherwood West area.
- Washington County completed its Urban Reserve Transportation Study (URTS), which provides updated transportation impact information to help with future planning in urban reserve areas.
- Completion of a significant update to Sherwood's Comprehensive Plan.
- The Sherwood City Council has prioritized adding employment land and job growth as a goal. Sherwood West is an opportunity to help achieve that goal. New state rules related to housing.

The 1,291-acre Sherwood West area is just one of Sherwood's four designated "urban reserves." Urban reserves are areas that the Metro Regional Government agency, in coordination with its partner cities, has designated for potential urbanization over the next 50 years. An urban reserve designation does not change a property's current zoning or restrict a landowner's currently allowed use of their land. It does, however, provide greater clarity regarding expected long-term uses of the land, allowing public and private landowners to make long-term investments with greater assurance.

We know that communities that plan for growth have the best chance of managing their destiny. Given that it is Sherwood's largest urban reserve area and its location near existing development and infrastructure, Sherwood West has been identified as the most logical direction for the city to look at next to plan for growth in the long-term.

The city convened both a technical and community advisory committee to guide the planning process. Their goal is to help shape the development of a concept plan that identifies strategies for how Sherwood can grow while retaining our sense of place and providing quality places to live, work, and play in Sherwood West.

The city has engaged the community through open houses and public comments at meetings to gather input on proposed concepts and themes for land uses, parks and trails, and the transportation network. Spring brings both rain and sunshine that cause grass, weeds, and other plants to wake up and go wild. Property owners handle all vegetation in their yards and planter strips next to the street. Vegetation must be less than 10 inches tall for

How to keep your home's vegetation in compliance with City codes


• Flowers/ vegetation/ shrubs can't grow onto the sidewalk or street. Keep the edges of all vegetation trimmed flush with the edge of the sidewalk and curb. • Trim dangling tree branches at least 7 feet above the sidewalk. Overhanging vegetation can block drivers' views of people, stop signs, and streetlights. Lowhanging branches can hit bikers and people walking.

Make sure your property's vegetation is not blocking traffic signs, signals, streetlights, or street signs. Keep shrubs and vegetation no higher than 3 feet on street corner properties and areas next to neighbors' driveways to keep vision clear for people, children riding bikes, and other vehicle traffic.
