

Our proactive city planning efforts included lobbying for federal funds and receiving (three million dollars) to construct a road through the Tonquin Employment Area, a vital location between Sherwood and Tualatin. This infrastructure development is a significant milestone towards our vision, as it enhances connectivity and prepares the land for industrial development, making it an ideal location for businesses to set up their establishments

The construction of 124th Street from Tualatin Sherwood Road to North Wilsonville was a major win. It opened up land for development and freight traffic, leading to investments in our community.

The fruits of these efforts are already visible. High-tech giants like Lam Research, DW Fritz, and NSI have chosen Sherwood as their home, signaling a new era of technological advancement for our city.

One last important note; The city has been collaborating with the community to plan for the next 20 to 30 years, with a focus on the vision for the Sherwood West urban reserves. I recommend that everyone take a careful look at the plan, which was developed by a committee of Sherwood residents and involved extensive public outreach. The plan has been approved by both the planning commission and the city council. It outlines our goal of integrating job and residential lands, with buffers between them, as well as extensive parks and trails that utilize the natural environ-

This plan will be a critical part of the council's conversation over the next three months as we consider asking Metro to extend the Urban Growth Boundary. We want to hear from you as we consider this question.

As your Mayor, I am deeply invested in ensuring that the city's growth does not overshadow it's character. By emphasizing high-quality job opportunities, we are crafting a narrative where Sherwood's residents don't just live here but also thrive professionally. This vision for Sherwood's future - where community values and economic prosperity go hand in hand - is a journey we are committed to, and with the continued support of our residents, it's a dream we believe will soon be a reality.



PLANNING NEWS Sherwood West Concept Plan

The Sherwood West Re-look project wrapped up in July, with the Council accepting the Sherwood West Concept Plan by Resolution 2023-060. The Concept Plan considered significant changes that have occurred in Sherwood and surrounding areas since the 2015 Preliminary Plan's approval: construction of the new 350,000-square-foot Sherwood High School, a major update to the City's Comprehensive Plan, completion of regional transportation studies, and new state rules related to the provision of a variety of housing types (Oregon House Bill 2001).

In 2021, the City began a public process to re-look at the Preliminary Concept Plan (accepted by Council in 2015) for Sherwood's next future growth area - Sherwood West. The 1,291-acre Sherwood West area is urban reserve land that will be added to the region's Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) and, over time, annexed into the City of Sherwood.

We know that communities that plan for growth have the best chance of managing their destiny. Given that it is Sherwood's largest urban reserve area and its location near existing development and infrastructure, Sherwood West has been identified as the most logical direction for the City to look at next to plan for growth in the long term. The Concept Plan will guide that growth so that Sherwood West is a livable community and a compatible extension of the City.

Every six years, Metro reviews and reports on the region's land supply in an Urban Growth Report, which includes a 20-year forecast of regional population and employment growth. The next Metro review of regional population and employment growth will occur in 2024. Metro may adjust the regional urban growth boundary ("UGB") if necessary to accommodate the growth forecasted for the next 20 years. During this review cycle, cities generally request to have their urban reserve lands brought into the UGB if there are appropriate areas to be

brought in.

The most recent Economic Opportunities Analysis and Housing Needs Analysis indicate that Sherwood has a land deficit for employment and residential needs. The City of Sherwood is considering a request for some or all of Sherwood West urban reserve area to be brought into Metro's UGB to accommodate future housing and employment needs. If the land is brought into the urban growth boundary, properties must still be annexed into the City boundary before City zoning can be applied. There are several ways for property owners to apply to be annexed, all of which will ultimately

While it is common sense that permits are needed for large projects, it can be dificult to determine if permits are necessary for smaller home improvement projects. Furnace installation and replacement sometimes falls into this category. Many who

a furnace, even like-for-like replacements. These are major home projects that require a great deal of work by contractors and installation teams. A permit helps ensure the contractors carrying out this work are licensed, insured and bonded. Additionally, a low-voltage electrical permit is also required for the control wiring and thermostat work that comes along with furnace replacement. Permits bring peace of mind to the project, as it can be dangerous if carried out by someone other than licensed professional.

Furnaces, whether gas or electric, are vented appliances that must be properly nstalled to ensure safety. If not properly installed, furnaces can cause illness, injury or even death. Permits provide a 3rd party inspection that ensures the installation meets manufacturer's guidelines and code requirements for safety and proper operation.

In the case of a furnace installation, permits can also help in the event of a mishap. f you do not have the proper permit and have your furnace installed improperly, nomeowner's insurance will most likely not cover the cost of damages, repairs or

comes to installing a furnace, and do not be misled by a contractor who tells you a permit is going to cost hundreds of dollars extra. The cost for a mechanical permit to replace a furnace and/or heat pump is just under \$80, which pays for the permit and inspections, providing safety and assurance that your project is done correctly n a way that will keep you and your loved ones safe. Electrical permits are issued by Washington County or through the Oregon Minor Label program.
