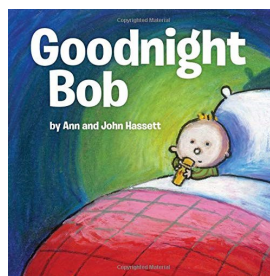

Using books and stories to help children think of their own solutions to problems helps them develop problem-solving skills. Researchers have found that having ideas for tackling problems helps children in learning new tasks and handling social situations.

This is Grandma's hat. (*Place hands on top of head.*)

And this is the way she folds her hands. (*Clasp hands together.*)

Just like that. (*Place hands in lap.*)

(*Recite second verse in a deep voice:*)

These are Grandpa's glasses. (*Make bigger glasses over eyes with fingers.*)

This is Grandpa's hat. (*Place hands over head to form a large hat.*)

And this is the way he folds his arms. (*Cross arms.*)

Just like that. (*Place head on arms as if sleeping.*)

(*Try switching it up, since not all grandmas are the same, and neither are all grandpas.*)



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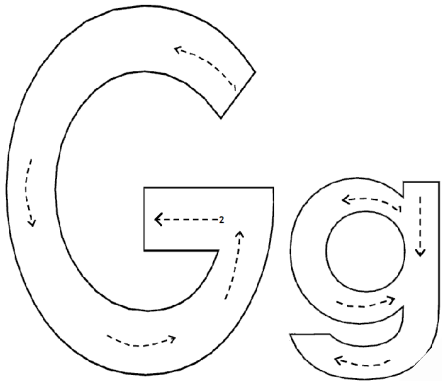
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Play
