Other Activities

We added "shelf-talkers" to the Juvenile Fiction series this quarter. This helps patrons easily find popular series for those who are first starting with chapter books, and also to find read-a-likes for other series they may not already be aware of. This fits in with our Strategic Plan. Kudos to Youth Services Librarian, Amanda Woods.

In November, Crystal Garcia, Adult Services Librarian, was able to attend an International Book Festival in Guadalajara, Mexico, to purchase Spanish-language materials that are unavailable in the U.S.A. This trip was funded by ALA and the Friends of the Sherwood Library. It also fits within our Strategic Plan.

Book Match @ Sherwood Public Library soft-launched this quarter. This is the new grant-funded reader's advisory concierge service. We promoted it through our book discussion programs, the Board and the Friends.

Service Stories

On the new option for a Youth Access Card, a WCCLS card that does not require parent permission:

Millie & Friends Preschool has been bringing the after school kiddos to the library Tuesdays and Wednesdays. It's been fun watching them use the library. I had a chance to approach her about the Youth Access Card because several of her kiddos have cards that they bring with them and many do not. The ones that come with their library card have them inside their clear plastic name tags—a perfect holder for their library cards, if I do say so myself—and they check out books while the other kiddos look on with longing eyes. I sent library card applications with her today in hopes that each student without a card can get a library card the next time they visit.

On our new "Abilities" collection of toy people and how they engage families to normalize the diverse abilities of people in our communities during play:

I was shelving picture books in the children's room and overheard a couple kids talking to their mom. First the daughter had the blind doll with sunglasses and her white walking stick/cane. She came up and asked her mom about the cane. Mom told her that the doll was blind and couldn't see the cane helps her not trip over things and fall. The girl pointed out that the doll had glasses and mom told her they were for her protection and that her eyes were a little bit broken. Her son was sitting at the table next to her playing with the doll in a wheelchair playing basketball. I couldn't hear him but mom told him that the wheelchair helps the man get around to play basketball and go to the store. There was a pause and mom said, yes it helps him go to work. Then another pause and mom said, no wheelchairs usually don't help people go upside down like that. I couldn't see but I could imagine the boy making the doll fly through the air upside down. —Submitted by Heather Eldred, Technical Services Library Assistant
