#### **Statistics**



The Library welcomed 367 new library card holders this quarter, 19% more cards than the same quarter last FY. We welcomed over 64,000 visits this quarter, an average of 711 per day.

Libraries help bridge the digital divide. Our public computers were used nearly 3,500 times this quarter.

Total number of sessions increased 4.3% this quarter compared to last year and the total time our public computers were used went up 3%. More than 5 out of every 100 visitors used a public computer this year.

Total local collection size is 52,690—including books, periodicals, movies, music, electronic games, Library of Things, and more. An average of 71% of the collection is in and available at any given time. Library patrons have access to 1.7 million items countywide. Nearly 9,000 new items were added to the local collection this year.

Total circulation increased 2.4% this quarter compared to last year, at over 93,000 total checkouts this quarter, with an estimated value of over \$2,000,000. Digital checkouts rose 42% and account for 16% of all checkouts. This year, total circulation is up nearly 5%, totaling nearly 374,000 checkouts. Community members checked out an average of 15.4 library items this year, with a total value of over \$8,000,000.

# **Programs, Events & Outreach**



We presented 155 events this quarter with nearly 7,200 participants—all part of our mission to inspire discovery, enrich lives and building community through equitable access to lifelong learning. Library events are always open to the public and free of charge. Nearly 600 events were presented this year, with 26,400 attendees.

Note some large events in 2017-2018 were not scheduled this year. E.g. Casper Babypants concert, Library User Survey, Harvest Festival at YMCA (no library participation), Onion Festival, Voices for the Performing Arts Youth Orchestra. Food for Fines had less participation, perhaps due to no longer charging overdue fines for children's materials. Homework Help changed from 3x/week to 1x/week. Forest fires during summer 2018 likely kept attendance lower for some events.

#### New Resources & Services:

- Test proctoring services added. We are now one of three libraries in the county that offer test proctoring.
- Simplified Chinese board books added to the collection. Expanded French & Japanese offerings to picture books, as well as board books.
- o New magnifying lamp added in newspaper reading room.
- o Purchased a new **3D printer**. Programming will start in October.

### • Training:

- Several librarian staff attended the joint Oregon Library Association / Washington Library Association conference in Vancouver, WA.
- Many staff attended a Homeless Training Institute session by Ryan Dowd, author of The Librarian's Guide to Homelessness.
- Conducted a listening session with the Sherwood School District SHARE Center
   Director about serving Latino families in Sherwood.

#### Management:

- Strategic Plan for 2017-2019 is at 80% completion.
- A new Facility Master Plan by Hacker Architects is being funded by the Friends of the Library. A presentation about options was given to the Library Advisory Board and Friends board members in June.
- Completed the Edge Assessment 2.0 with a score of 739/1000. We are above the national average in all four categories of the assessment.
