

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# Statistics *Library Cards*




Washington County Cooperative Library Services cards issued at Sherwood Public Library give patrons access to 1.6 million items throughout the County.



This June, we saw a **record 176 new library patrons register for library cards**—nearly double our monthly average. The increase is largely due to the Summer Reading Program and a Cultural Pass to Evergreen Wings & Waves, which brought in many new faces.

Out of 11,532 locally registered library cards, 26% were active in June, and 13% on average were active each month this FY.



## Library Visits and Open Hours

The Library was busy with **nearly 23,600 visits in June—19% more than in May** and an average of 91 people per hour. Much of this activity was due to heavy use during Cruisin' Sherwood, Summer Reading and school being out for summer.

That's 83 visits per open hour and 11.34 visits per capita for the Sherwood Library Service Area of over 22,000 people.

Average of 252 open hours a month, with a schedule of 7 days a week for 60 hours—in addition to 24/7 access online at wccls.org.

June checkouts, when including digital, increased slightly from last year.






## Collection Development

June was uncharacteristically high for number of items added, at 945, due to workflow this year. We **added nearly 6,800 items this FY**, slightly more than last year.

Periodicals continue to be the largest segment of the local collection, with over 150 unique titles with weekly, monthly and quarterly publication. Over 1,000 newly published titles were added to the adult collection. Our "available now" Best Sellers collection was replenished with over 400 hot titles. The local collection is over 49,000 items. Another 32x that many items are available County-wide through WCCLS member libraries.

**Library volunteers boosted our workforce in June by 1.22 FTE**, allowing staff the flexibility to provide direct customer service, reference and readers advisory assistance, program development and collection management. New this year, we had a cadre of 6 enthusiastic volunteers to help with the Summer Reading Program. Many of them also helped at other programs, allowing larger scale programs for multiple age groups.



### 2,294 total volunteer hours, FY 2014-2015

Boost to our workforce was 1.08 FTE.


New volunteer positions this year include Homework Helpers, Summer Reading Program assistants, and a Publicity Courier.

## Library Programs


This year we focused on increasing programs for school-aged children, teens, and adults—thanks to new flexibility with Librarians in Adult Services and Youth Services.

- Patrons have been thrilled about the Wings and Waves pass, provided by WCCLS. We have rarely seen them so excited about any pass. Sherwood already had 12 reservations for the pass, barely 24 hours after it went live.

- A woman came to us to find the location of her grandfather's land, which she had visited as a child and wanted to see again. She only had an old rural route address from the 1960s. I contacted Clackamas County Historical Society and we determined the location from historic maps. —Pinn Crawford

I simply wanted to let u know that the fact that last week's performance was held in the performing arts center was a greatly appreciated.


