SHERWOOD PARKS BOARD MEETING MINUTES

REGULAR SESSION

1. **CALL TO ORDER:** Board Chair Scheirman called the meeting to order at 7:00pm
2. **BOARD PRESENT:** David Scheirman, Jim Craig, Steve Munsterman, Rodney Lyster, Barbara Leitzinger, Jim Booker, Tara Khodadadian, Cory McLennan, City Councilor Doug Scott
3. **STAFF PRESENT:** Assistant City Manager Kristen Switzer, Volunteer Coordinator Tammy Steffens, Operations Supervisor Harry Banister
4. **ADJUSTMENTS TO AGENDA:** None
5. **APPROVAL OF MARCH MEETING MINUTES:**

**MOTION: FROM BOOKER TO APPROVE THE MARCH MEETING MINUTES.
SECONDED BY CRAIG. MOTION PASSES.**

6. **CITIZEN COMMENTS:** Jeff Fletcher of Sherwood presented Exhibit A to the Board. He reminded the Board that the Parks Master Plan refers to the parks system supporting physical health and pickleball contributes to that. He stated that Newport, Ocean Shores, and Tualatin are all doing better than Sherwood. Sherwood “fails” the pickleball community by only offering two courts. He felt that Snyder Park is not the best location because it is very windy. He believes that the City should provide a first aid kit and a lock box at the courts. He feels that the wind screen is in the wrong spot. His observation is that other cities are proactive, and “Sherwood is failing”, the City should find more locations for courts – possible Woodhaven Park – and have an indoor facility. Board Member Munsterman asked how many people Fletcher feels are unserved. Fletcher estimated 25 or more. Booker asked how many people play on Sherwood School District courts. Fletcher didn’t know. McLennan shared that the YMCA has designated times. Fletcher stated that those will go away during the summer when school is out.

6. NEW BUSINESS

- **Sherwood West Property Update (Switzer)**

Switzer shared that the City closed on the purchase of 8 acres off Haide Rd (Exhibit B). Booker asked how many are good for fields, etc. Switzer will research and report back. Scott stated that this area could have more of a nature park feel opposed to a sports park. Switzer announced that she received an email from Metro that the Metro Local Share amount is \$1.14 million, and the funds could reimburse this purchase or go towards the purchase of neighboring property.

- **Tree Removal Request (Banister)**

Banister reviewed Exhibit C with the Board.

MOTION: FROM MUNSTERMAN TO APPROVE THE TREE REMOVAL REQUEST. SECONDED BY CRAIG. MOTION PASSES.

7. PARKS MAINTENANCE REPORT (Banister):

- Park shelter reservations are open and already busy
- Water features will start on May 23
- Staffing schedules will adjust to accommodate water features starting May 24
- 52 flower baskets have been hung throughout Old Town
- Plans are underway for Sherwood Cruisin'
- Spring plantings have begun
- Fertilizer is being applied

Booker asked about the "pond" at Stella Olsen boardwalk area. Banister stated that the body of water was never meant to be a pond. He explained that wooded debris is back causing the collection of water which is very damaging to the boardwalk and stage, and there is concern about the structural integrity of the boardwalk being under water. That area was designed to be a flowing creek corridor. Clean Water Services oversees this corridor.

8. STAFF UPDATE (Switzer):

- Volunteer Appreciation Dinner is Tuesday, May 13, 6pm, at the Sherwood Center for the Arts.
- There are three member terms that are expiring in June. Two of the members will be reapplying. One will be open to community members.
- Arbor Day Tree Planting event was successful. This year the City partnered with the 3rd graders at Middleton Elementary.

9. COUNCIL LIAISON ANNOUNCEMENTS (Scott)

Scott stated that the Traffic Safety Committee has been made a Board so will no longer be under that Police Advisory Board and will now report directly to City Council. Budget meetings will be May 22, 29, and June 3. The City is switching to a 2-year budget cycle. He encouraged everyone to attend or watch online. Booker asked what the hardest part for Parks in the budget is. Banister replied that it would be the playgrounds. The next

City Council meeting is May 6 with a Work Session prior with the Family Justic Center. They will also be discussing building and licensing fees. Scott announced that the sale of the recreation facility to the YMCA fell through. The City continues the operating agreement with the YMCA. The Executive Director relocated to the YMCA in Illinois, so the Sherwood YMCA is currently in the process of hiring a new Executive Director. Scott extended an invitation to the Parks Board to attend a Work Session to discuss pickleball. McLennan suggested including the Senior Advisory Board to be part of that discussion. Scheirman asked Switzer to research what is the recommended distance between pickleball courts and residential housing and other pertinent information and add to the agenda when ready. Switzer stated that she would try for June. Lyster asked is the City would bring in a third party to run a pickleball program. Switzer stated that the City was always open to discussing options. Booker asked how people could get involved with possible trail planning discussions for the tannery site. Scott said we needed to focus on the clean-up first. Munsterman shared his opinion that the concern about noise from pickleball doesn't mean we should shy away from it. Scott believes that balance is important.

10. OTHER: Munsterman also shared that a friend of his from Wilsonville had recently joined him for breakfast and they spent four hours in Old Town. His friend was very complimentary of how Old Town was laid out.

Pickleball followers are more likely to hail from higher (22% vs. 8%) and middle-income brackets (42% vs. 35%) than the general population.

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Predominantly White:

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Pickleball players are largely white, with 73% of participants being white.

Other Notable Points:

- **Average Player Age:**

The average age of a pickleball player is just under 35 years old, with the number steadily dropping each year.

- **Growth Across Age Groups:**

Pickleball has seen increased participation across all age groups, including a significant increase in younger players.

- **Inclusive Sport:**

Pickleball is an inclusive sport, appealing to diverse demographics.

- **Core vs. Casual Players:**

A significant portion of pickleball players are casual players (1-7 times a year), while a smaller segment are core players (8+ times a year).

- **Social Aspect:**

The social aspect of pickleball is a big draw, particularly for younger generations.









Figure 24. Sherwood West Trails and Open Space Network




Tree Removal Parks and Storm Water Quality Facility




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
- Remove 8- Red Alder Tree, with 6" average DBH due to severe lean and hazard to public
- Remove 3-Big Leaf Maple with 12" average DBH, due to leans that have not corrected themselves, hazard to the public
- Replant number of trees within this general area

Gleneagle Storm Water Quality Facility (SWQF)




- Remove total of 6 trees with range of DBH of 5"-25". Species include Alder and Oak
- Site will include planting of trees and shrubs throughout SWQF

Storm Water Quality Facility behind 21207 Copper Terrace




- Remove 1 volunteer-Black Cotton Wood Tree, with 21" DBH, due invasiveness of tree and damage of asphalt access road
- Replant more suitable tree within the SWQF

- Replant after removal.

Subject: Arborist Report – On-site Inspection Completed 3.13.2025

I inspected one multi-stem Oregon bigleaf maple tree in the park that could impact the above listed property.

Description: One multi-stem Oregon bigleaf maple (*Acer macrophyllum*). The tree height is approximately fifty-feet tall with a trunk diameter of twenty-two inches as measured four and a half feet above ground level. The canopy spread measures approximately forty-five feet in diameter.

Evaluation: The health and structure of the tree are rated poor. The tree is a multi-stem, however has since lost the co-dominant stem growing towards the south. The remaining stem is growing over the back yard of the address listed above. Upon further inspection decay was found in the remaining stem.

Results: Due to the trees overall poor health and structure rating, the trees location and surrounding targets, I recommend the tree be removed.


All recommendations are based on good forestry practices and abide by the International Society of Arboriculture Standards and Best Management Practices.
