

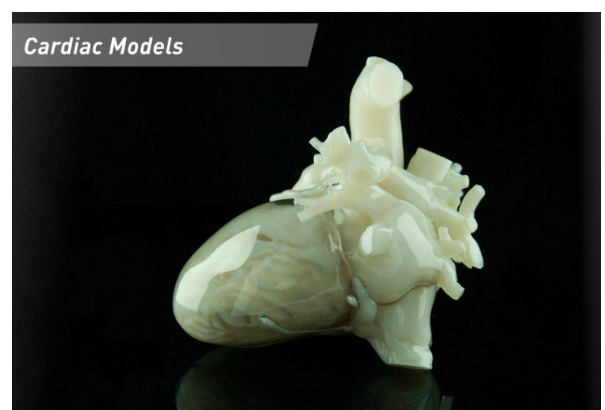
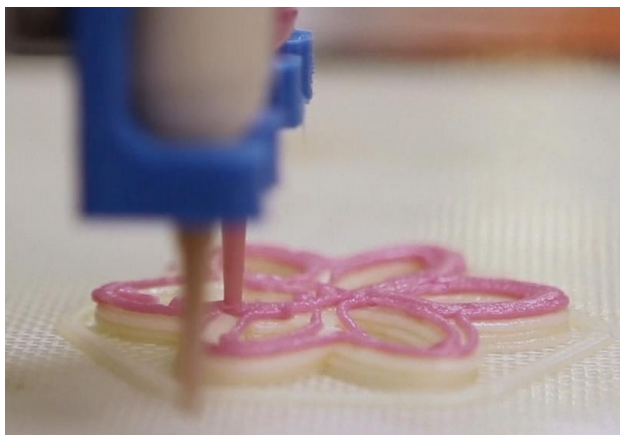
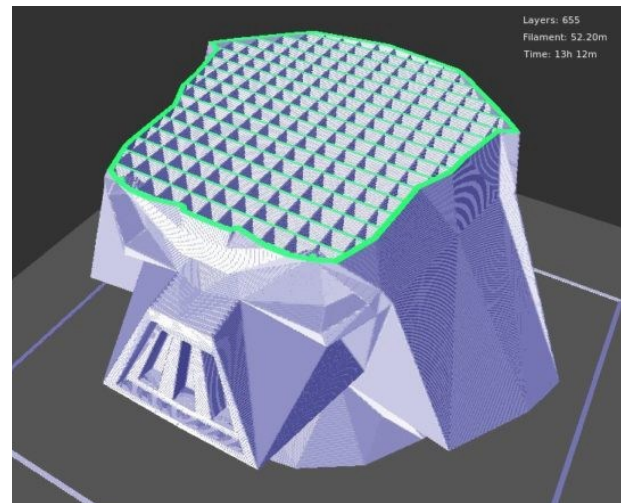

WHAT IS A 3D PRINTER?

- 3D printers are devices that create 3D objects layer by layer from a variety of materials, often using computer models to create the objects.
- The programs that create these models are known as Computer-Aided Design [CAD] software.
- 3D printers are often used for manufacturing purposes, but have also been used in the fields of medicine, construction, and baking.



TYPES OF 3D PRINTERS

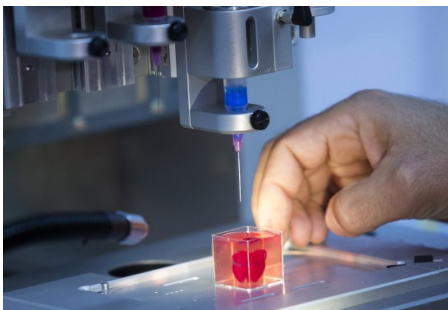
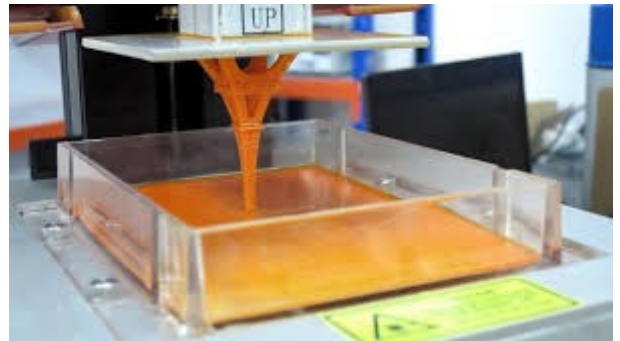


Fused Deposition Modeling: **Plastics/Metals**

- Slow, melts materials and layers them to create objects.
- Advanced methods melts metallic powder in printing to strengthen objects.
- Wide variety of uses, including all types of manufacturing and medical uses.

Stereolithography /Digital Light Processing: **Resin Printing**

- Uses liquid resin to build plastic models
- Good for clear parts
- Messy, objects need to be finished through



Tissue Printing

- Still in its early stages, medical technology
- Uses tissue and cells from a person to print tissue and organs, using protein and cells

Food Printing

- Wide variety of uses, customizable foods
- Uses proteins, chocolate, cheeses, and other ingredients to create food items



TYPES OF FILAMENT



Poly(lactic acid) (PLA)

- Eco-friendly, non-toxic, biodegradable.
- Brittle, stiff material, easy to break and degrade.
- Easy to print with, many options for colors and types, small sweet odor during melting.
- Good for models and solid objects.

Acrylonitrile Butadiene Styrene (ABS)

- Non-biodegradable, oil-based materials. Recyclable.
- Hard, but shock resistant, able to bend.
- Easy to print with, many options for colors and types, harsh toxic odor when melted.
- Good for fasteners and joints, sturdy and multiuse.



Poly(ethylene terephthalate) Glycol (PETG)

- Non-toxic, but non-biodegradable, made from polymers. Recyclable.
- Durable and flexible like ABS, but safe like PLA.
- Easy to print with, many options for colors and types, no odor.
- Good for all types of objects, but its flexibility makes it less suited for support structures.

Thermoplastic Polyurethane (TPU)

- Non-toxic, non-biodegradable, polymer-based materials. Difficult to recycle. More expensive.
- Durable, but very flexible and stretchy.
- Difficult to print with, easily absorbs water from air. many options for colors and types. Good for shoe soles, phone cases, watertight seals and more.



Polyamide (NYLON)

- Non-biodegradable, synthetic polymer. Non-recyclable.
- Stronger and more durable than ABS/PLA/PETG.
- Difficult to print with, since it easily absorbs water from the air. Some options for colors and types, toxic odor when melted.
- Good for hinges or high-strength parts.

IMPORTANT PARTS OF A 3D PRINTER

1) Filament Spool Holder

- Holds the spools filaments which produces 3D objects.

2) Extruder

- Threads in the filament on top and uses motors to push it down towards the nozzle

3) Nozzle

- Melts the filament so it can easily be formed into thin layers, very hot.

4) Print Bed

- The surface on which 3D object are printed, heated so prints can stick easily. The bed is also raised and lowered as part of the printing process, and must be leveled.

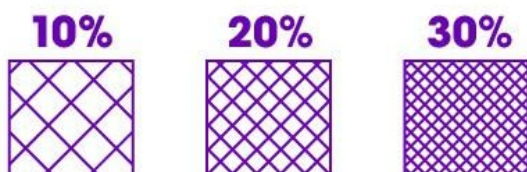
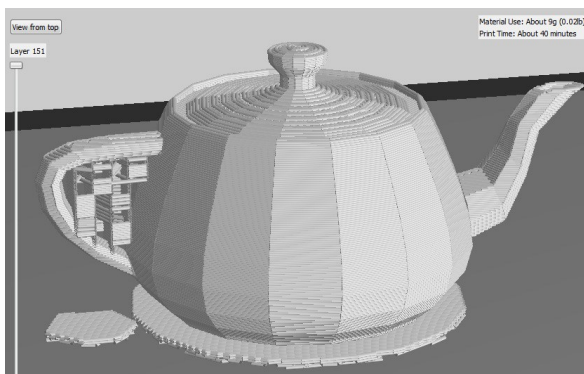
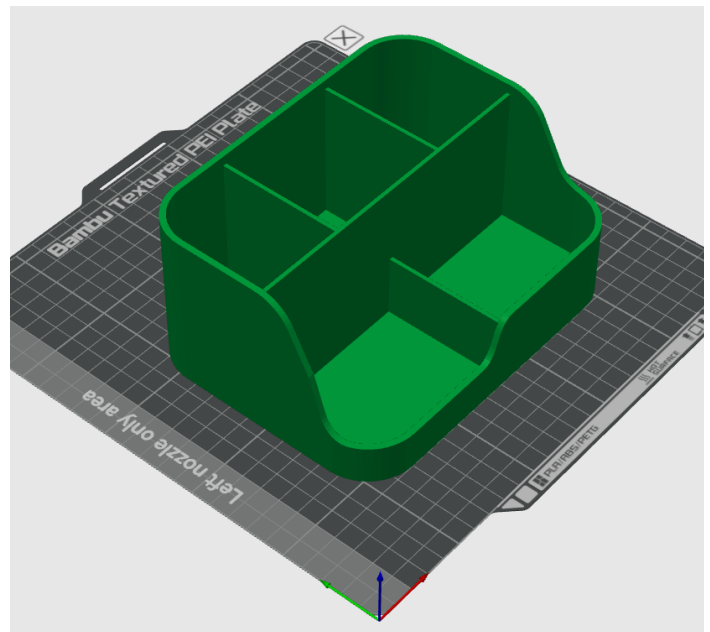


USING A 3D PRINTER

Once you find or create an object to 3D print, you have to load the print to the printer, modify the print settings to your liking, start and monitor the print, and remove the object when finished.

Loading the Print

- The printed object will be a .STL or .OBJ file.
- Load it onto a 3D printer in a variety of ways; some printers allow for wireless/USB transfer, others need software.
- Once the print is loaded, you can set the objects on the bed and preview the build using the slicing tools.
- These loading/preview screens also allow you to view your print job from multiple angles, to make sure it's what you want.



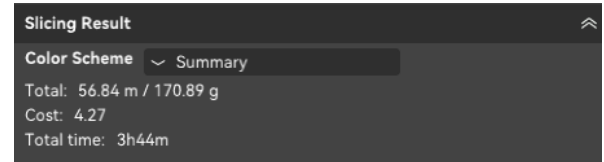
Print Settings

- There are several important settings you can change, such as the size/scale of the object and its location on the print bed.
- You can add multiple objects to the print bed to be printed at the same time.
- You can choose to build your objects on a small raft, a thin layer of plastic to separate your builds from the print bed.
- Previews also show scaffolding to bridge gaps, which can be modified or removed.
- An important setting is fill level; you can choose the density filled in space your object has, between 1% and 100%.
- Fill level directly relates to the strength, weight, and duration of your build.

USING A 3D PRINTER [CONTINUED]

Starting the Print

- When you click BUILD and start the print(s), you'll get an estimated print time. Make sure you have enough filament to complete your print.
- Depending on the type of 3D printer and print bed, you may have to do extra prep work to get the objects to stick to the bed.
- The print bed and extruder will preheat to their necessary temperatures, and begin printing.
- It's only really important to monitor the print at the very beginning, then only intermittently until it's done.

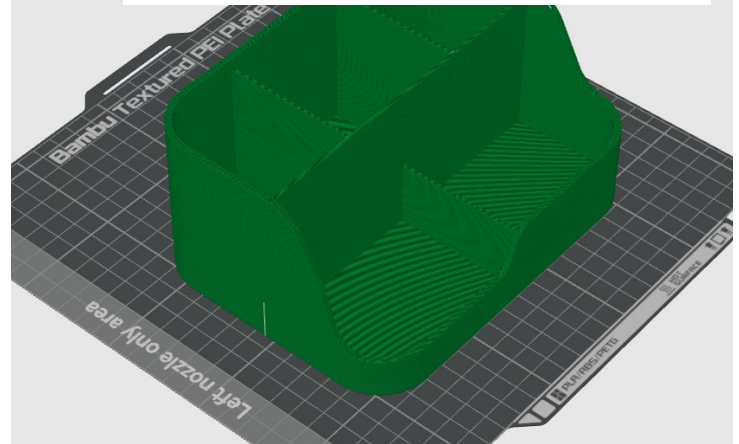


Filament Grouping [Why this grouping](#)

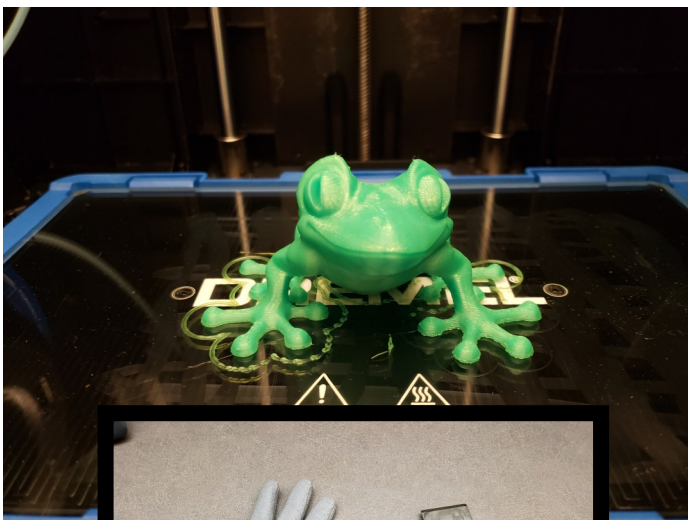

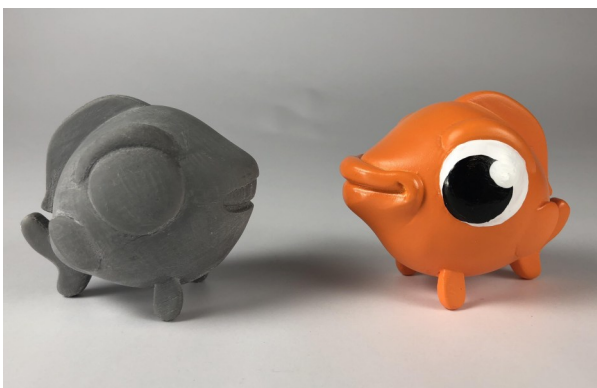
Removing the Object

- When the print is done, be sure to let the object(s) and print board cool before attempting to remove them.
- On many 3D printers, you should remove the entire bed, and then the prints from the bed.
- Carefully remove the print(s) using a spatula tool, be sure to wear gloves as many spatulas are sharp.
- If your builds have rafting, they'll be easier to remove from the bed, but the rafting can be tricky to remove.



CLEANING UP AND FINISHING PRINTS

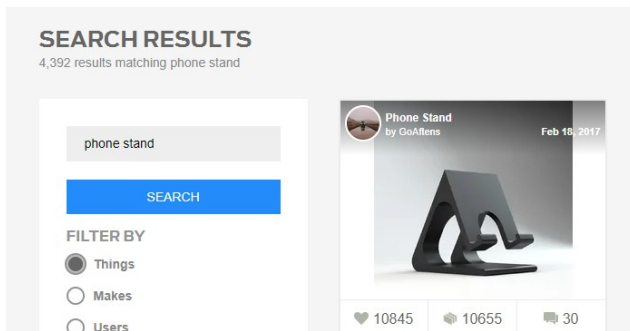
- If your finished builds have rafting or scaffolding, remove them carefully with wire cutters or pliers. Wear gloves when working with these sharp tools
- You might need to use sandpaper to get off any residual filament or rafting, or to smooth out your objects. Acetone can be used to dissolve excess rafting that can't be removed otherwise.



- Once you have removed all excess filament and scaffolding, you can finish your prints by sanding and painting them.
- You might choose to use a cheap sandable epoxy to fill in any gaps or if the print still looks rough after initial sanding.
- Acrylic paints and water-based paints should do well for PLA/ABS/PETG objects. Nylon objects need a primer before painting.

FINDING PRINTABLE OBJECTS ONLINE

There are many amazing websites that contain .STL or .OBJ objects that are already ready to be download and 3D printed. Downloaded prints can be modified with CAD [computer aided design] software if needed, if you wanted to make modifications to the design.

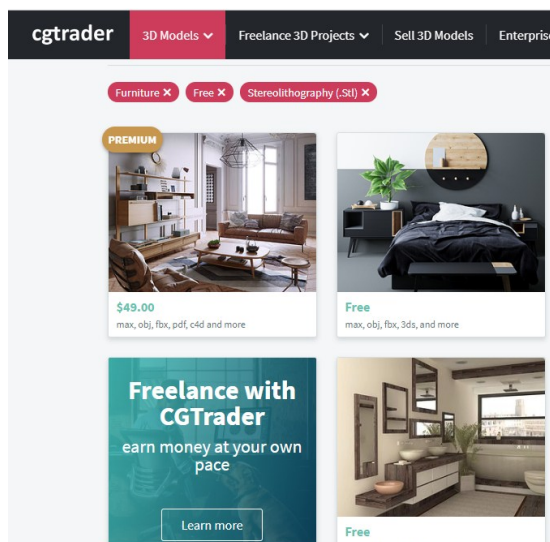
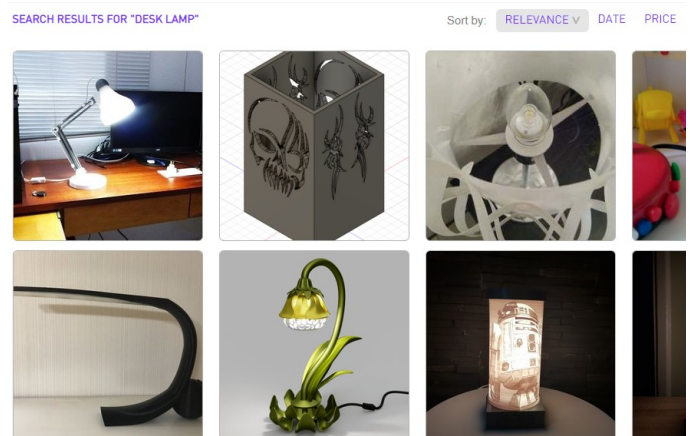


Thingiverse [thingiverse.com]

- You can filter your searches by free objects.

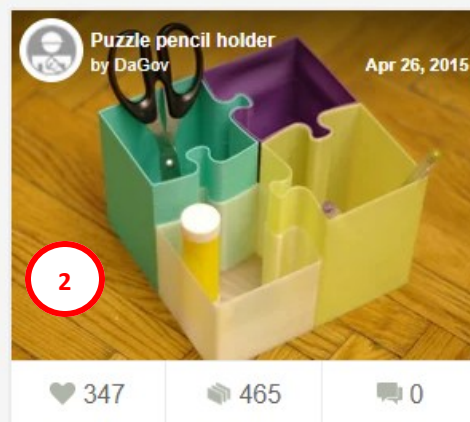
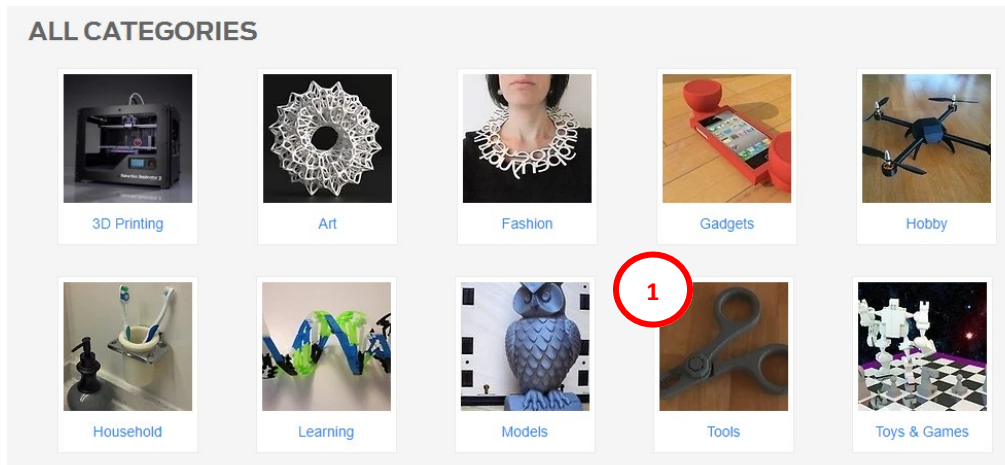

1. Go to the website [www.thingiverse.com]
2. Use the Search Bar or Explore Tab to find an object to print.
3. Click on the object to view info on it and the files for downloading. Some objects contain multiple files for printing.

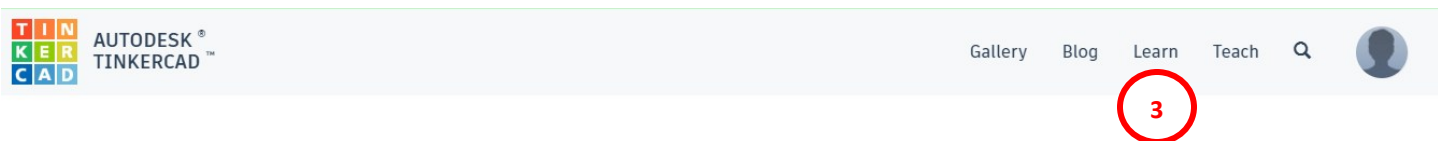
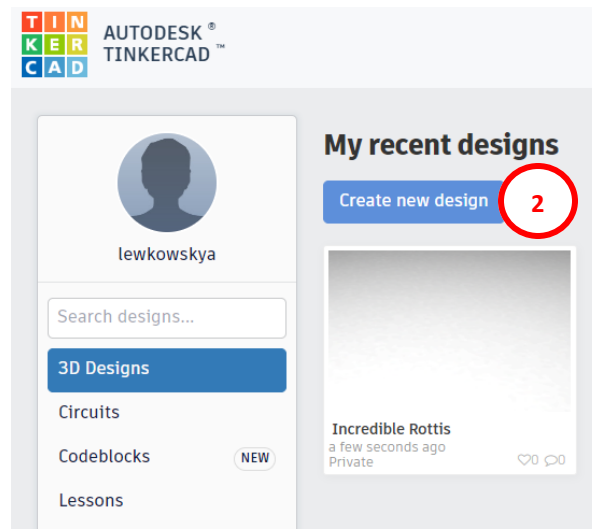

CREATING AND MODIFYING OBJECTS

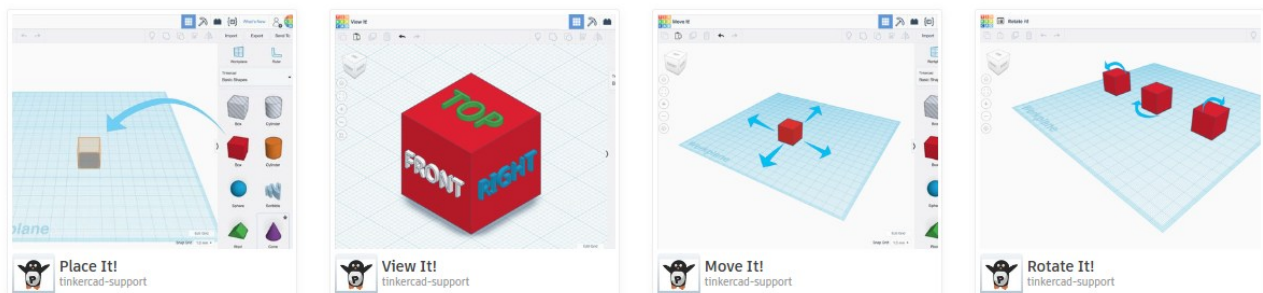
There are several great CAD [computer aided design] programs on the market, some are free like FreeCAD and TinkerCAD, others like Rhino and AutoCAD cost thousands a year (though AutoCAD is free for students/educators/facilities). Let's focus on the free, cloud based service of TinkerCAD today.

Using TinkerCAD

1. Go to the website [www.tinkercad.com] and sign in.
2. Click on CREATE NEW DESIGN to pull up a blank workspace. You'll need to do this even if you want to upload an object for modification.
3. Click the LEARN tab to take lessons to learn more about developing objects on the site.



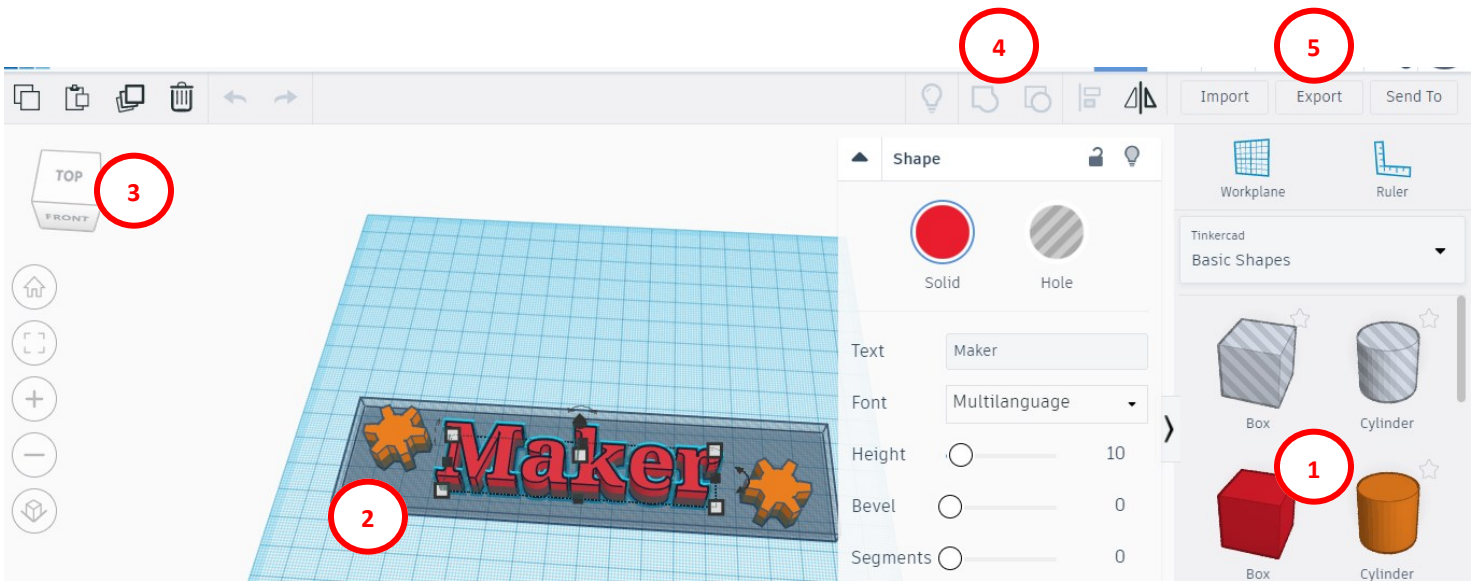
Starters define basic 3D design functions, and link to relevant Lessons to develop your skills.

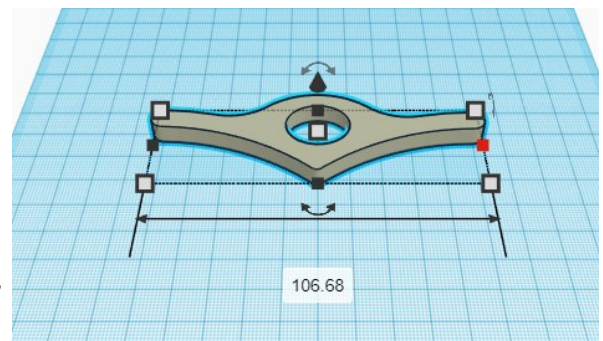
Creating an Object

1. When on a blank workspace, click onto objects/shapes/text to move them to the workspace area.
2. Click on individual objects/shapes/text in the workspace to modify their dimensions. You also can modify what is written in text this way.
3. Change the angle at which you view the workspace by right-clicking and moving the mouse, or clicking the box in the upper left-hand corner.
4. When you have all everything placed how you want, select them all by drawing a box around everything and click on the GROUP button to make it one object.
5. Download your object to a printable .STL or .OBJ file using the EXPORT button.



Uploading and Modifying Objects

1. When on a blank workspace, click the IMPORT button to choose a file to modify.
2. Click on the object to modify its dimensions, or add more shapes/objects/text to it from the right-hand panel.
3. Once you've got the object modified to your liking, select it all, click GROUP, then click EXPORT to download the new file to be printed.

1. Search the Thingiverse website and check out some of the free objects they have for printing. Pay attention to objects that have multiple parts, and how they connect together.
2. If you feel up to it, create a login for TinkerCAD and play around with some of the design shapes. The website has a tutorial section, and there are other sites (such as the Instructables page to the left) that give detailed instructions on making projects in TinkerCAD.
3. In TinkerCAD, note that every object gives you the possibility to use the shape as a hole, allowing you to reshape other solid objects through grouping.
